EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

He combined his love of photographing tennis with gymnastics. No return financially came from the sport of gymnastics but his contribution in terms of travel, time and photographs is well remembered.

He was at the 1979 Rhythmic World Gymnastics, the first time Australia appeared at a Rhythmic Worlds event. He subsequently went to the 1979 Artistic World Championships where Australia had a Men's team for the first time. Without his camera we would have no record of these two historical moments.

He also came willingly to the 1981, 1983, 1985, 1987 and 1989. World Championships travelling and working in difficult conditions, as always with the life of a photographer. Everyone pushes and elbows to get a better advantage for the best shot.

Always pleasant and willing to do anything for the team, he will be sadly missed by those of us in Gymnastics. It is a credit to Peter because of his nature and personality he was respected by the FIG Official Photographer, Eileen Langsley, who often commented on how pleasant it was to work with someone who knew photography so well, but was still a gentleman.

Peter gave us the understanding and basis for having good photographs in our magazine, "The Australian Gymnast", and many others who had worked with him not only as a colleague but also when he was in the role of a teacher will also miss his counsel.

Later in the magazine, the vale and appropriate acknowledgement through his photographs appears. The goal of the magazine is to ensure quality photographic representation of our beautiful sport and Peter gave us a very sound basis to have that goal and objective from such an early part in our history.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT



In the last issue, I stated that following our unprecedented success at the 1991 Indianapolis Artistic World Championships our Technical Directors were to meet in December 1991 to review our Development Plan and that the AGF Board were to appoint a Marketing Consultant to ensure our financial viability for the future. Both those events have occurred and more.

We also were awarded by the International Gymnastic Federation (FIG) the right to host the 1994 Individual Artistic Gymnastic World Championships. We have worked diligently over the years to prepare ourselves for this great opportunity

and now it has come. The first of a series of reports is published elsewhere in this issue.

In turning away from the excitement of being awarded the World Championships and returning to our strategic planning, much more has again occurred. The Technical Directors of all disciplines met in December last and with the National Executive Director, Coaching Director and Development Director completely reviewed our Development Plan. This was so successful, and with a Marketing Consultant in place, that a Conference of State Executive Directors was convened in January to further analyse and refine the Development Plan and in particular to place an emphasis on Marketing.

The November AGF Board Meeting appointed Michael Browning and Associates as the Federation's Marketing Consultant and ratified his appointment as Marketing Director on the 1994 Championship Board of Directors. He has in the past underwritten our two Grand Prix in 1989 and 1991 and is undertaking the same function with the 1993 "Seiko" Grand Prix. This means that Michael

Browning looks after our total marketing strategy to lead us towards a degree of financial independence.

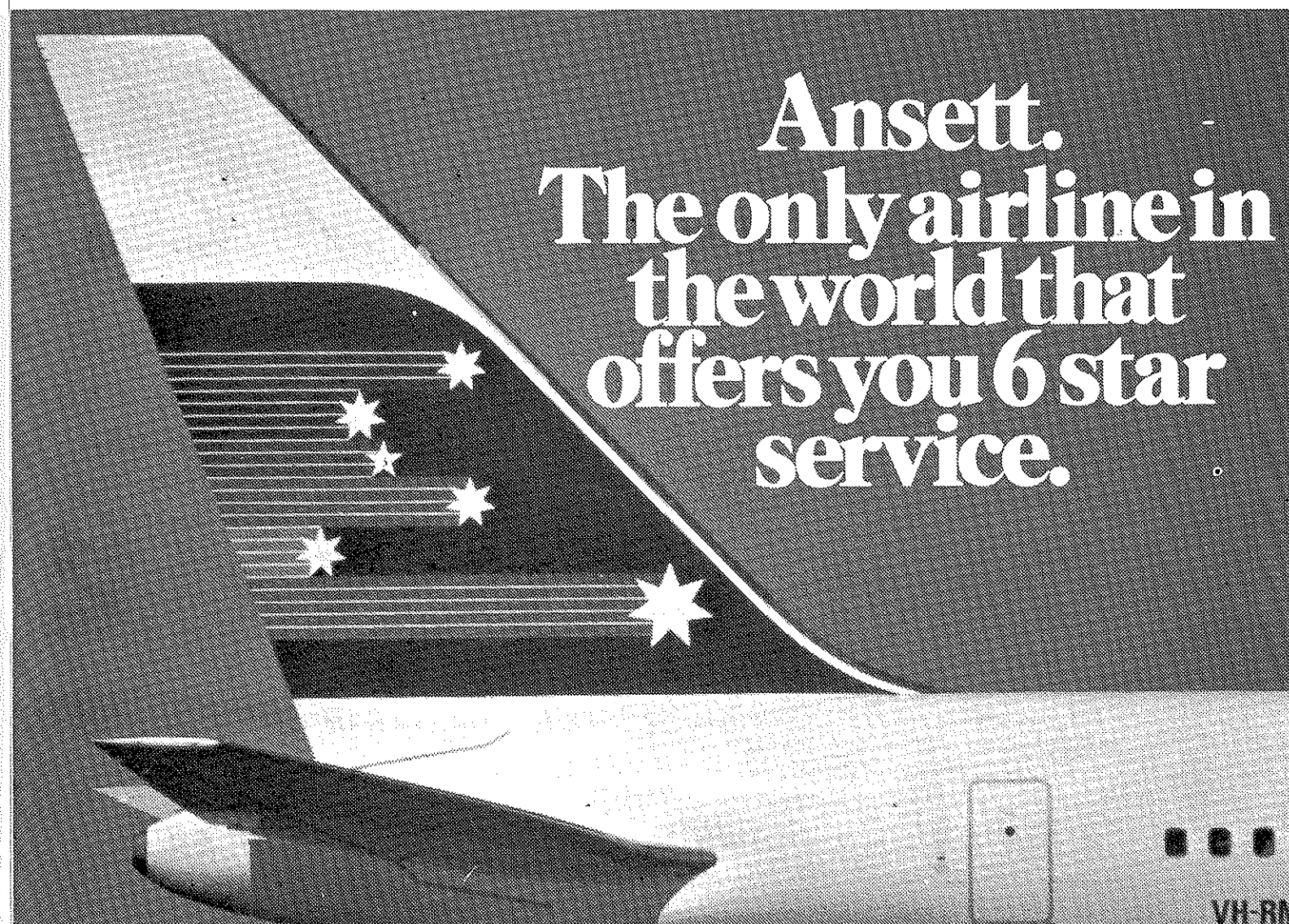
Michael also attended the State Executive Directors Conference in January and gained valuable insight into the workings of the Gymnastic infrastructure. He also provided an overview of how the marketing strategy should be put into operation, explaining the difference between priorities and opportunities. The latter having to be grasped as they arose.

He emphasises the point that the 1994 World Championships was a catalyst for a package to be offered to potential sponsors. This Conference was a success from all points of view, especially for the further understanding of the need for two way communication. Our sport is burgeoning now and it is most important that we can harness our resources to cope with the expansion.

With the Barcelona Olympics just around the corner our Artistic Elite Programmes are under pressure and for us a major preliminary event is the new format Individual Artistic Apparatus World Championships to be held 14th-19th April 1992 in Paris. We are taking four male and two female gymnasts. Five (5) is the maximum number of gymnasts per discipline per Federation. It will be most interesting to decide which apparatus should be competed, especially for the men as we have to impress the FIG Technical Committee with our new standard, Australia more than ever is now under the spotlight.

We wish our gymnasts and the accompanying judges and officials all the best of success in these endeavours on our path to Barcelona.

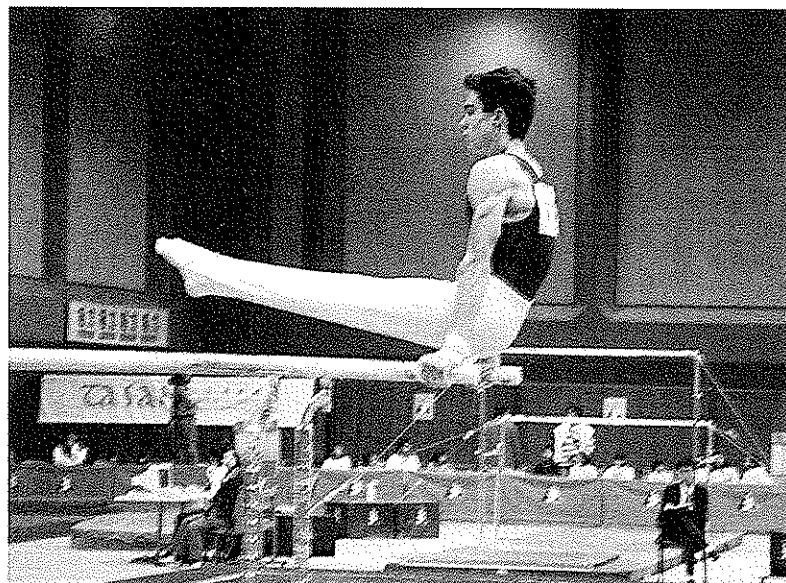

1994 GYMNASTIC WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

REPORT FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE

In September 1991 immediately after the Indianapolis Artistic Gymnastic World Championships the Executive Committee of the International Gymnastic Federation (FIG) awarded the 1994 Individual Artistic Gymnastic World Championships to the Australian Gymnastic Federation, to be hosted in the City of Brisbane in April 1994. This was the start of an exciting new venture for Australian Gymnastics.

The November 1991 AGF Board Meeting confirmed the legal basis for this event, appointed Directors etc, and much planning is now underway to set up the appropriate organisation for this event.

A separate legal entity is to be established. A company incorporated in Queensland and limited by guarantee with a number of representative and independent Directors. They are as follows:

An independent chairman will be appointed in due course.

The AGF will enter into a contract with the FIG guaranteeing the basis of hosting the event both from a financial point of view and the quality of the event. In turn the AGF will contract the new company to organise the Championships.

We already have a reputation for hosting international events and it is worth recalling previous events so that we do not forget the forerunners that have provided the necessary experience to win the FIG's approval.

This Championship will be the third Championship, following a new FIG format of annual championships, to lift our sport's profile and specifically geared to television presentation. The first such Championship will be held in Paris from 14-19th April 1992. This is a FIG Competition III, Individual, Artistic, Apparatus Championships.

The other types of Championships to be held in the Olympiad are:-

- * October 1992 in Brussels, BEL
FIG Competition II in Rhythmic Sportive Gymnastics
- * April 1993 in Birmingham, GBR
FIG Competition II and III, Individual, Artistic, All Around Championships and Apparatus Championships
- * 1993 Alicante, SPN.
RSG Competition II, Individual All-Around
- * April 1994 in Brisbane, AUS/FIG
Competition III, Individual, Artistic, Apparatus Championships
- * RSG - Group, Competition II and III, Individual All-Around
- * October 1994 in Dortmund, GER - A special team event MAG and WAG
- * In 1995 the "complete" World Championships, as we know it, in Artistic Gymnastics ie: Competition I, II and III, will be held in Sabae, Japan.
- * The 1995 RSG "complete" World Championship. The venue will be decided at this years FIG Congress.

The cycle then commences again in the Olympic year 1996.

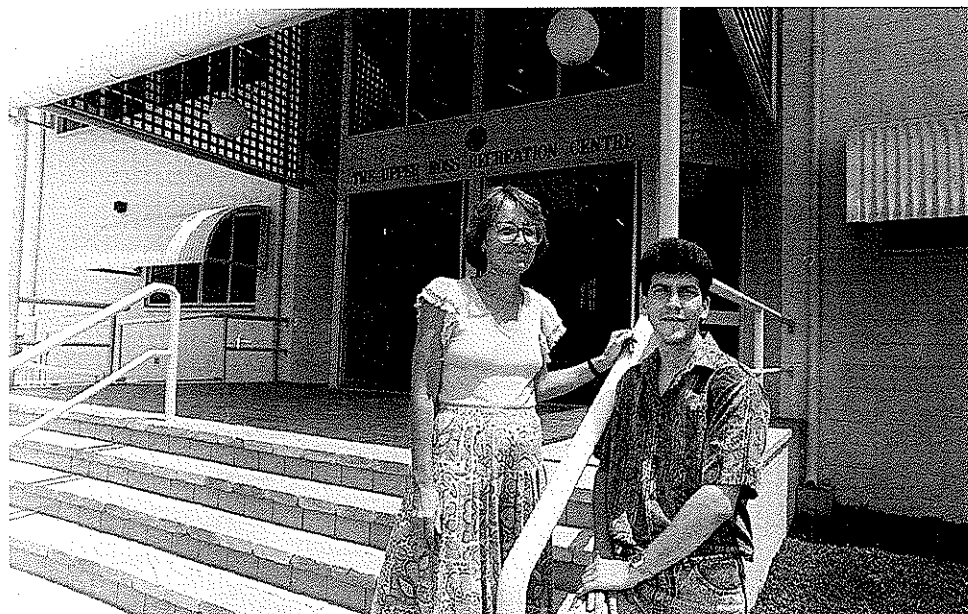

Regional Centre to host MAG Junior/ RSG Classic 1992

The fourth Australian Junior Mens and Rhythmic Sportive Gymnastics Classic Championships will this year be hosted by a Regional Centre.

The Northern Region of the Queensland Gymnastic Association will be hosting the Championships on the 25th and 26th September, 1992 at the new Upper Ross Recreation Centre in Townsville, North Queensland.

This will be the first time an event of this magnitude is to be held outside a Capital City. Mrs Audrey Kuskopf, the Championship Director, said: "Last year it was held in Perth and many of those competitors will once again enter these Championships".

Officials expect 250 competitors from every State and Territory in Australia, except Tasmania, to attend the Championships. New Zealand is also sending over a squad to participate in the events.

"The boys will compete on six Olympic apparatus in the Under 12 - levels 5, Under 14 - level 6 and the open - level 7 events," Mr Daren Wolfe said. Mr Wolfe is the Assistant Championship Director and one of the Judges for the Championships.

"While the girls compete with a selection of hand held apparatus in the Under 12, Under 14, Under 16 and Open Competitions," Mrs Kuskopf said.

These National Championships help develop young gymnasts so they can eventually compete at World Championships. They also help lift the profile of gymnastics which is a popular and growing sport in Australia.

Prior to the Championships two days have been set aside to practice and meetings. This will give competitors a chance to get used to the equipment before the competitions and officials can discuss the future of gymnastics in Australia.

Currently the competitors are participating in preliminary competitions in their Regions in order

to gain selection for the State Titles. From these Titles they can be selected to compete in the National Championships here in Townsville.

During the National Championships the boys will compete compulsory and optional routines and their scores will be added together for their final mark. While the Sub Senior Men will complete optional routines. The girls on the other hand complete the rhythmic event competitions and apparatus finals and their scores count towards their final mark.

It is anticipated that each State or Territories well as New Zealand will supply a Level 2 or 4 Judge and a minimum of six Registered and Accredited Coaches for the Championships.

In the future it is hoped that similar Championships will be hosted at other Regional Centres and this will help encourage many young Australians to take up this technically demanding yet highly rewarding sport.

The talented tiny tots from the Australian Institute of Sport are aged from nine years and two of them were so excited they had nightmares the night before.

Their welfare officer, Robin Allen, the mother of Australian Commonwealth gold medallist Monique Allen, said the gymnastics, or "grubs", had been up since 5.30 ringing their parents and getting their hair done.

When Mrs Bush arrived with the now familiar pomp, helicopter surveillance and tight security, although less intense than for President George Bush, the athletes went on show, spear-headed by Australia's team of internationals, Monique Allen, Peter Hogan, Tim Lees, Lisa Read, Brennon Dowrick and Julie Anne Monico.

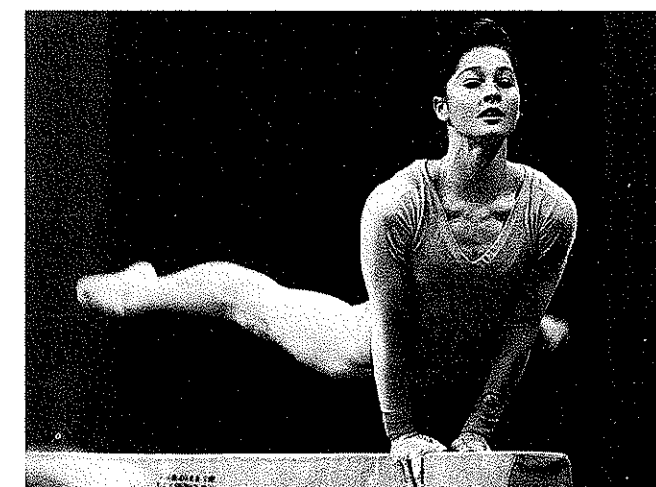
They had plenty to show off after Australia's "fairytale" showing at last year's world championships in Indianapolis where the girls' standing went from 16th to 6th, qualifying them for a berth in the Barcelona Olympics this year.

Then the internationals put on a first-rate display, earning an appreciative American-style "bravo" from Mrs Bush.

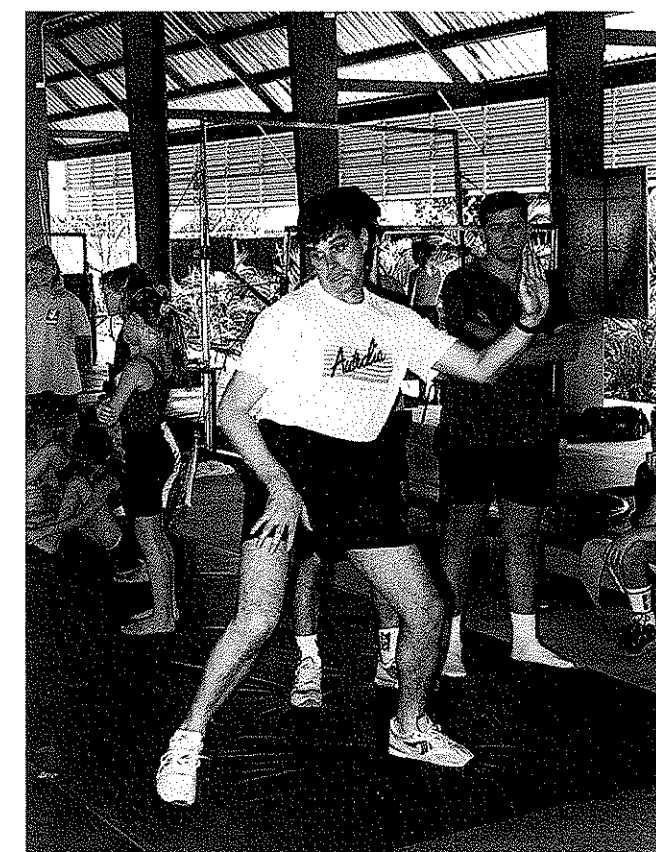

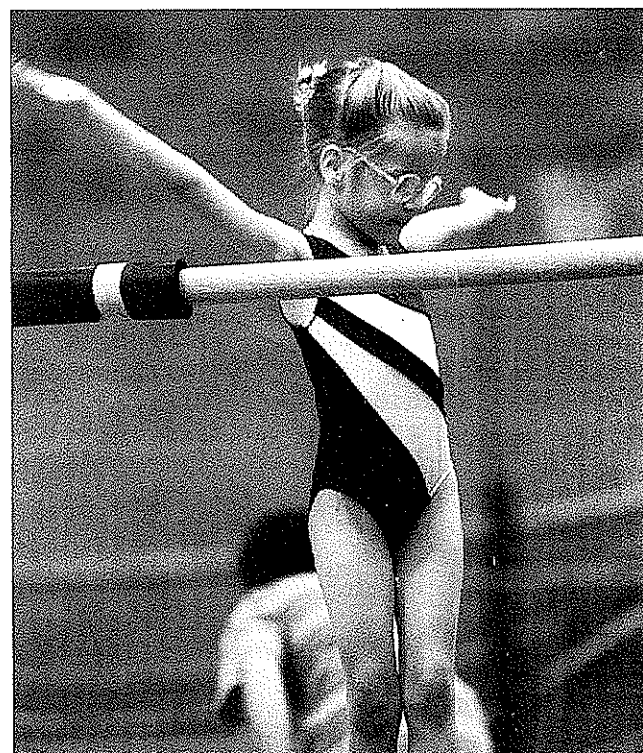
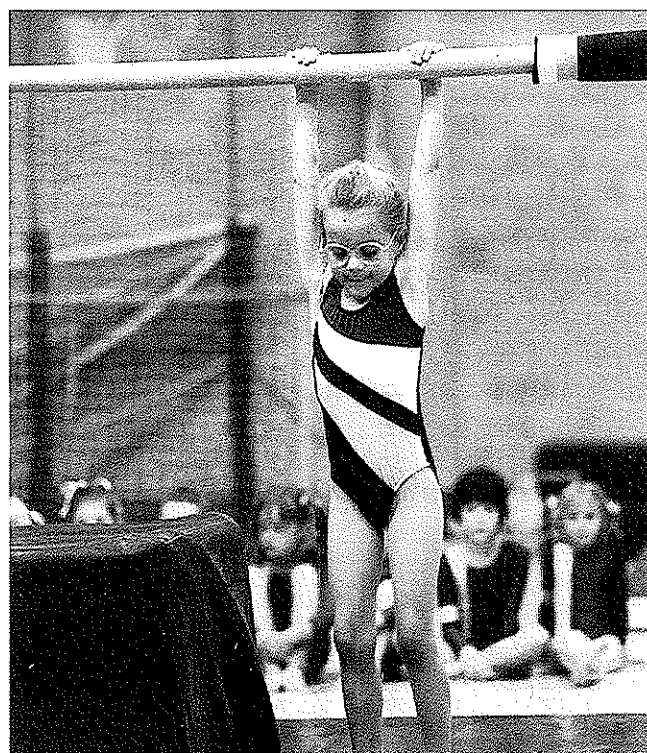

MEN'S GYMNASTICS COACH

ASSISTANT MEN'S GYMNASTIC COACH TO NATIONAL COACH

JOB DESCRIPTION:

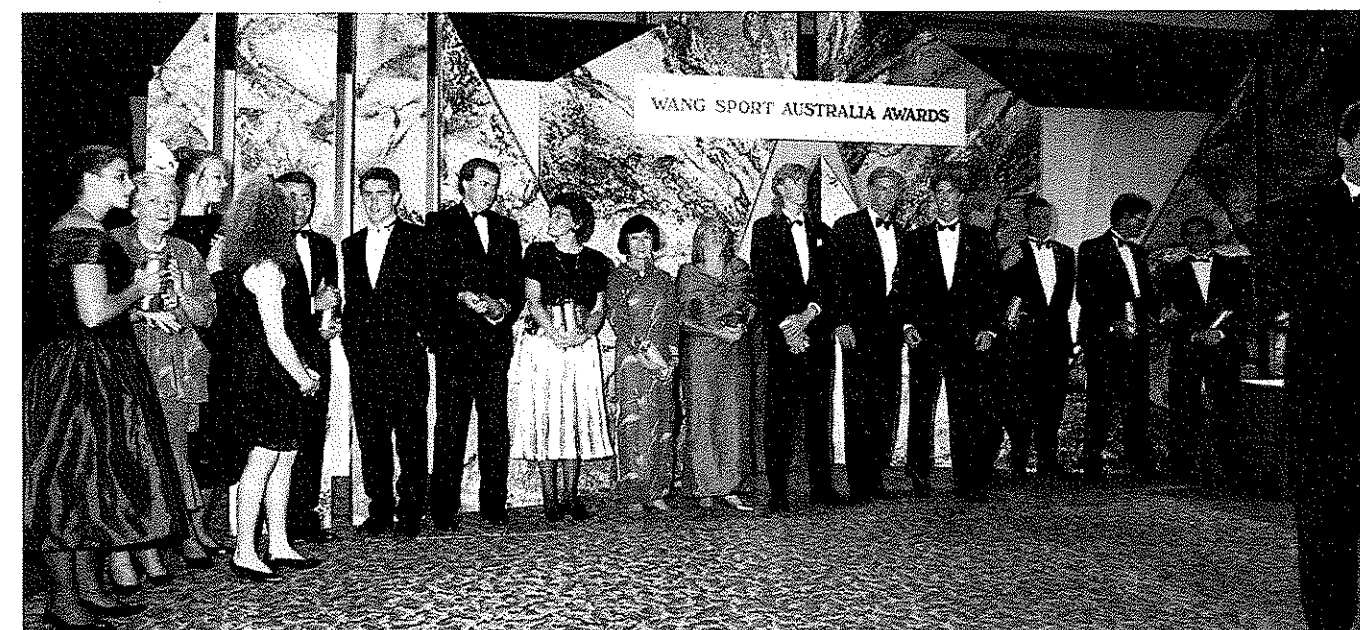

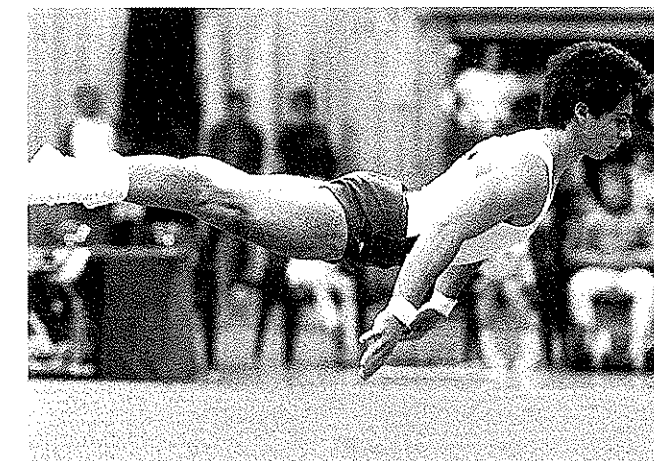
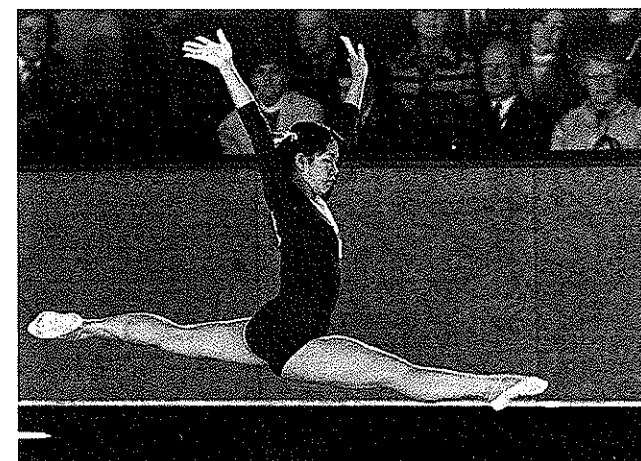

Peter Meyers, the quiet gentleman photographer as he was known to the Australian Gymnastic Community, sadly lost his battle with illness at the beginning of 1992.

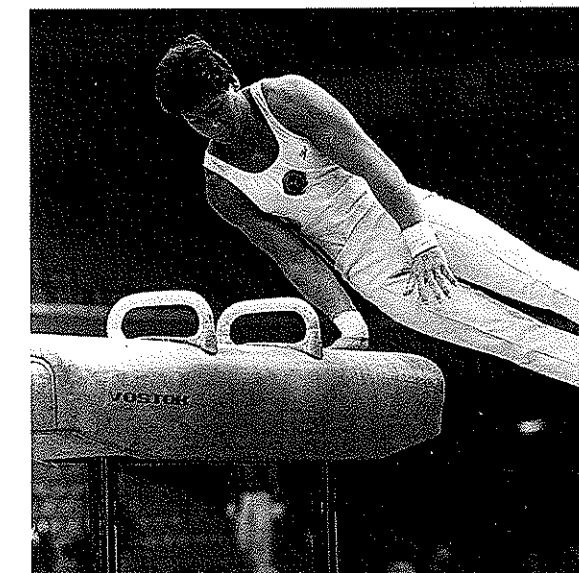
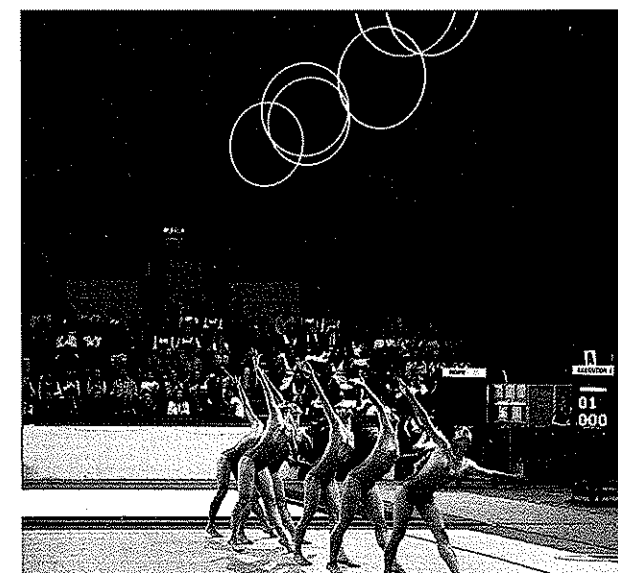
For his enormous contribution to the sport of gymnastics through his professional photography over a period which spanned nearly 20 years, he will indeed be missed.

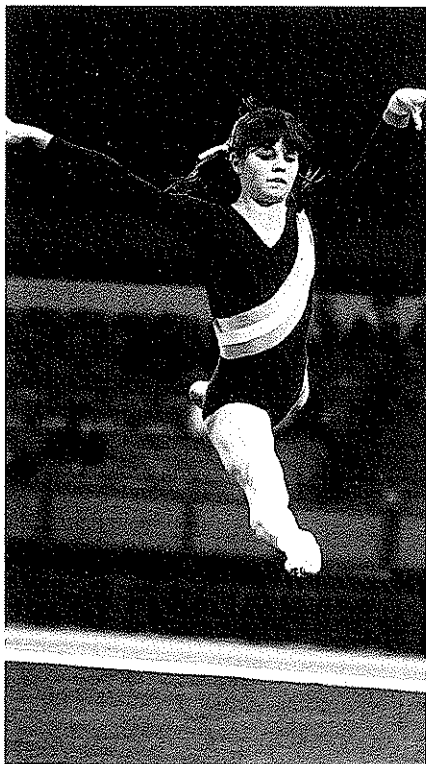
By trade Peter was a fitter and turner and operated his small business in a suburb of Melbourne.

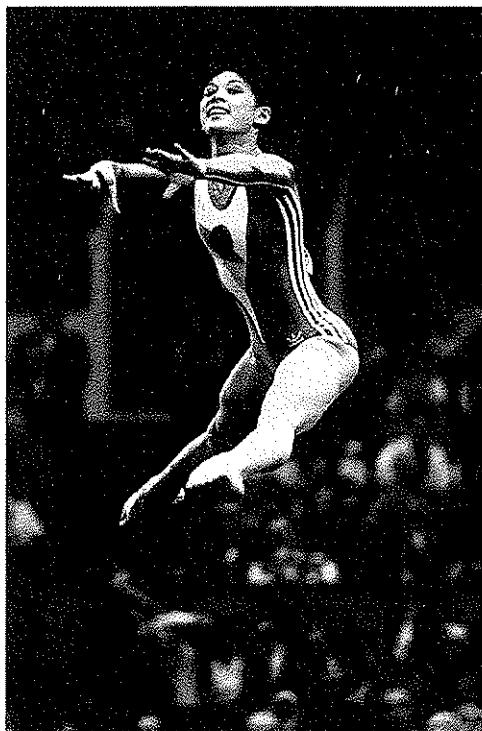

We wish to remember Peter through his photographic contribution to gymnastics.

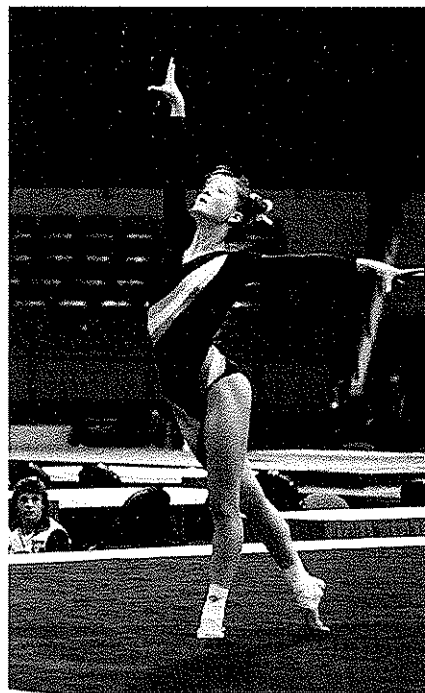

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VISIT TO KRYLATSKAIA - MOSCOW

Every coach knows that the former Soviet Union has some of the most talented athletes and coaches in the world. Gymnastics is no exception. The USSR has won more Olympic and World Championship medals throughout the last twenty years than any other country in the world. I have always wanted to observe what goes on in a Soviet training center, so when the chance arrived to visit Krylatskaia Training Center in Moscow, there was no way I was going to pass it up.

Our delegation consisted of myself (I am a coach at Head Over Heels Gymnastic School in New Jersey) and two coaches, six gymnasts, and parents from Paragon Gymnastics, also located in New Jersey. Our group had originally consisted of forty people, but when the Persian Gulf War broke out, people were nervous about flying, so twenty eventually made the trek to Moscow.

Here is a summary of our trip and a description of the exciting events which took place even after we returned home.

Friday, February 15 -

- 2 p.m. Our bus left Paragon for John F. Kennedy Airport in New York City.
- 4 p.m. Arrive at JFK amidst heavy security due to war.
- 7 p.m. Leave JFK on Yugoslav Airlines bound for Belgrade.

Saturday, February 16 -

- 9.30 a.m. Arrive Belgrade, Yugoslavian capital.
- 11.30 a.m. Leave Belgrade for Moscow, USSR.
- 4.40 p.m. Arrive in Moscow.

After an exhausting seventeen hours of travelling, we landed safely on an icy Moscow runway. From the minute we arrived we were treated like royalty. It took us all of five minutes to walk through the "Diplomats Only" line in customs.



We were greeted by our two interpreters, a delegation host, two representatives of Komsomolskaya Pravda Newspaper and various family members - a big welcome party!

After boarding our bus and arriving at our hotel, we were served dinner consisting of fresh meat, cucumber and onion salad, beets, and the best bread I have ever eaten. Each day we were served fresh eggs, soup and lunches and dinners as mentioned above. It looked as if most of the food I had brought along in my carry on bag would be left uneaten. We were overwhelmed with generosity the entire week.

Sunday, our first full day, was spent walking through Red Square and the Kremlin and seeing the changing of the guard outside Lenin's tomb. It was absolutely amazing!

The next day we took our six gymnasts to the Krylatskaia Training Center for their daily training with a group of Soviet gymnasts and coaches. As we approached the facility I could not believe how large it appeared to be! As we entered we learned that it houses many sports including track and field, swimming and gymnastics. We entered into a very large open space, complete with video games, which was used as a recreation center. We turned right and walked through a long hallway which had a TV and VCR set up. On the walls were large black and white photos of many of the great gymnasts who trained there: Shaposhnikova, Zhakarova, etc.

At the end of the hall was the gym itself. It was surely the most complete facility I have ever seen. Everything a gymnast could need was there, including a balcony for visitors, an in-ground trampoline adjacent to a pit, pits under each event, a mirrored wall for dance classes (along with a live piano player!), and coaches galore. The gymnast to coach ratio was 2:1. Talk about individualised attention! The coaches seemed to walk from event to event rather than stay on vaulting, bars etc. After each rotation the gymnasts would march to the floor exercise mat and line up for head coach Sergei Shelest.

We were impressed that Sergei took the time to coach our group the entire week. Along with our six American gymnasts, fourteen year old Lena and ten year old Sveta (who was so small we assumed she was six or seven) were chosen to work out with our group.

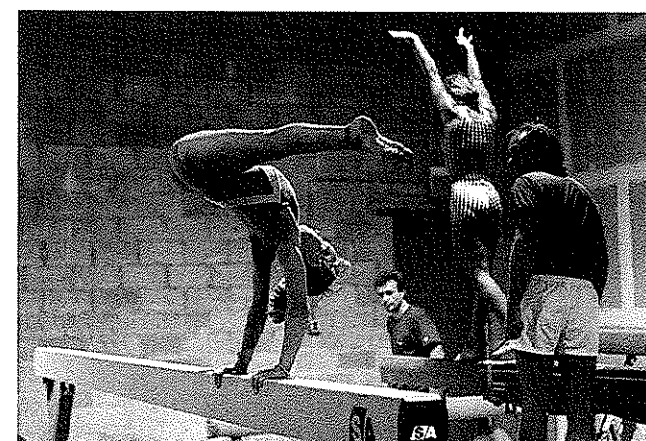
Each day our girls trained between ten and one, which left plenty of time for sightseeing. Drills and basics were stressed here; Sergei, along with his two helpers, explained how tapping on the top of the low bar would make a giant swing easier. Double front somersaults were emphasized on trampoline, first in a belt and then from the trampoline into the pit. Then we were shown some different strength and flexibility exercises which we were able to use in our own program upon returning home.

Lena demonstrated her **full out** on the tumbling strip. That was only one of the many difficult skills we saw that week. We also witnessed a front handspring double front on floor and a double front brani out off bars. Tatiana Lysenko later showed this dismount to the world in Indianapolis.

On the third day we had a very special treat - Natalia Shaposhnikova worked with our group on beam. What an opportunity!

As the week wore on, we realised that the Soviet system doesn't have any big secret to success - it is just plain and simple hard work. Three workouts a day plus daily dance classes. Place the best coaches with the best gymnasts from around the country in an intense environment such as this and success will come.

Our entire group had a good time handing out gum and new leotards (I thought they would kill each other trying to get to them!) and trading pins.

Little Sveta became my buddy that week, for each time she would complete a tumbling pass she would walk past me to get back in line and give me a huge smile! On the very last day I called her into the changing room and pulled a Barbie Doll out of my gym bag. I thought her eyes might pop out of her head! In a country where you wonder if you will have food to eat or a warm coat to wear in the winter, a simple doll is definitely a luxury. "Spaseeba!" she said. She then jumped up and down, hugged me and kissed me. You would have thought she had just won the lottery. It made the entire trip worthwhile.

We did not leave Moscow without giving the Krylatskaia team an invitation to visit us in America, although we realised that would be difficult. The Soviets are not used to allowing their National Team members to take vacations at will.

In August the unbelievable happened. On a Sunday afternoon at John F. Kennedy Airport in New York City, Sergei Shelest and Natalia Shaposhnikova walked off an Aeroflot Airlines jet along with five tiny girls and two representatives of Komsomolskaya Pravda newspaper. The newspaper sponsored the team's trip.

It turned out the team had an intrasquad competition and the top five girls got to make the trip. The coaches did not even tell the girls where they were going until the night before they left, just so they wouldn't be disappointed if for some reason their plans were cancelled.

We learned the gymnasts came from across the USSR but all of them train in Moscow. They were Junior National Team member Valerija "Lera" Yudina and Svetlana "Sveta" Toropova, both from the Soviet Republic of Khirgizia, near China;

Tatiana "Tanya" Pil, who was second on beam at the USSR Nationals, from Alapersk; and Olga Galako and Galina "Galia" Turok, both from the Ukraine.

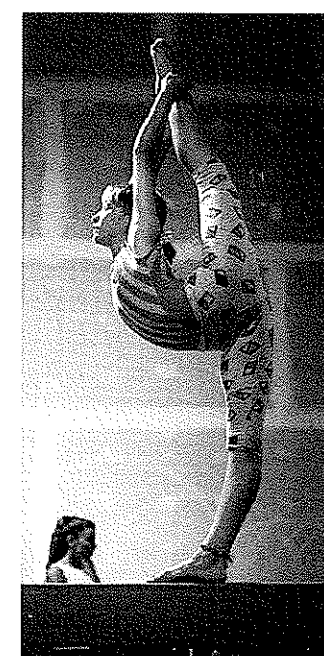
We placed each gymnast and coach with a host family. As long as they trained each morning for two to three hours, then the rest of the day was free to sightsee, shop or go to the beach.

Natalia and Sveta stayed at my house and a great time was had by all of us. Many trips were made to the toy store, where Sveta picked out some new Barbie clothes, to Great Adventure Amusement Park and to the beach. The girls also had fun trying bowling for the first time, and Lera beat everyone on the Soviet and American teams! They also enjoyed shopping at the local mall and flea market, and most of all, they enjoyed eating. Natalia and Sergei did not seem to restrict the team's eating at all, and the girls definitely took advantage of it.

One day we went to an "all you can eat" buffet lunch. Lera fit three plates of food into her little body, then two bowls of ice cream, then topped it off with an ice cream cone! I'll never know where she fitted it all.

Towards the end of the week the Soviet girls put on an exhibition with our girls. Both teams had a lot of fun. Besides having a good time, the Soviets displayed some awesome difficulty.

Lera dismounted beam and floor with double backs, and on bars completed a front giant to Jaeger with her legs together and dismounted with half in, half out. Tanya opened floor with a triple twist and ended with a double tuck, while on bars she performed a Tkatchev, Gienger and double tuck. Olga did beautiful giant to full pirouettes on bars and a nice punch front somersault on beam. Galia completed great giants to a double tuck off bars' however, Sveta stole the show with her standing triple back on floor (with a little help from Sergei) but also did a fantastic beam routine including three flip flops and a flip flop layout step out!

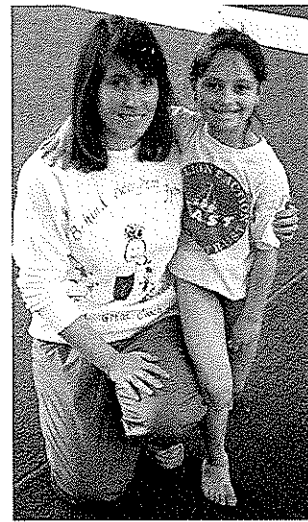
Many good friendships were made and many tears were shed when it was time for the Soviets to return home. We look forward to making a return visit to Krylatskaia in the near future.

If you ever get the opportunity to visit a Soviet training center, get ready to have an incredible time. And remember, don't forget the Barbie Dolls!

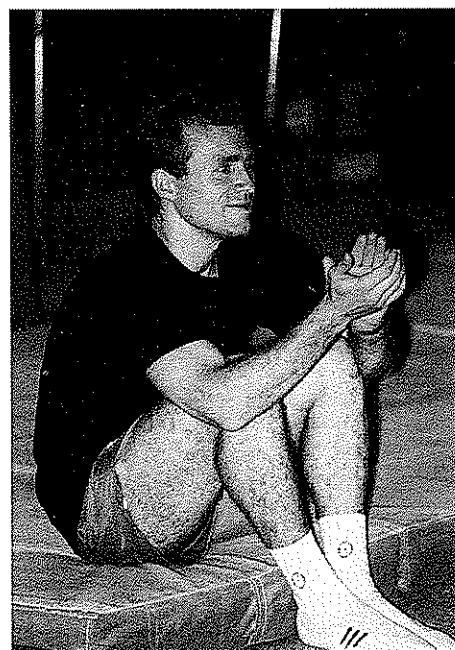

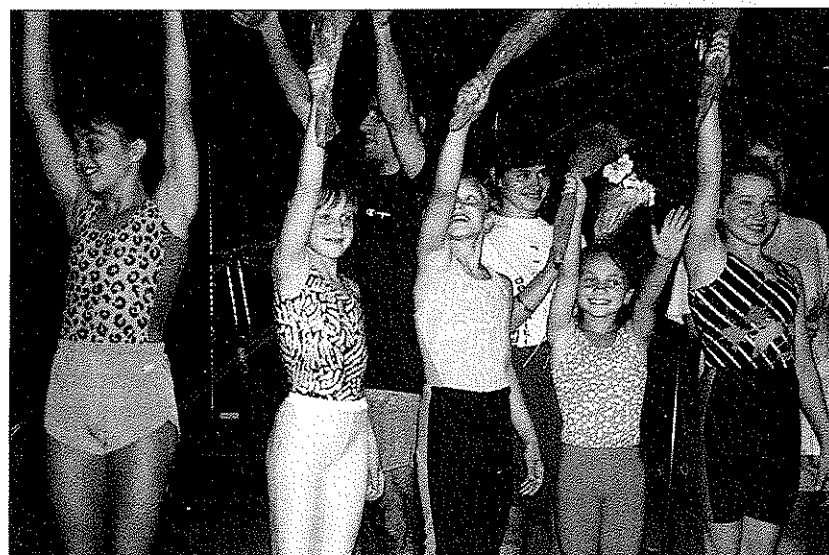

OLYMPIC CHANCE FOR MLC AWARD NOMINEE

The Nest Egg People

Young Perth gymnast Tracey Gibbs has become a strong contender for a place in the Australian team for the Barcelona Olympics.

The rapidly developing talent of the City Beach High School student has also been recognised by a nomination for this year's MLC Junior Sports Western Australian Achiever of the Year award.

Tracey was a member of the Australian team which finished second in the Junior Pan Pacific Alliance competition in Hong Kong late last year.

Competing in her first international and overseas competition, and against the cream of junior gymnasts from the China, Japan, New Zealand and Korea, the 14-year-old Duncraig girl finished ninth overall.

Tracey is one of 500 scholarship holders who are supported through MLC's \$650,000 national junior sports sponsorship program.

Monthly nominees for Achiever of the Year awards in each state are selected from outstanding performances across the 41 individual sports covered by the scholarship scheme. Fellow gymnast Monique Allen won last year's New South Wales title, while the Western Australian award went to Perth diver Vyninka Arlow.

Despite the top ten finish, Tracey was disappointed by her performance in Hong Kong.

"I thought I should have done a lot better", she said, "although I didn't feel I was at my peak. I scored 9.40 in the bars, which is my best event, but I didn't perform up to my expectations. The team result was a real surprise, however."

At the Australian national titles last year, Tracey finished second in the bars behind Australian Champion Monique Allen. If she can reproduce that sort of form at the Olympic trials in May, she has an excellent chance of selection for Barcelona.

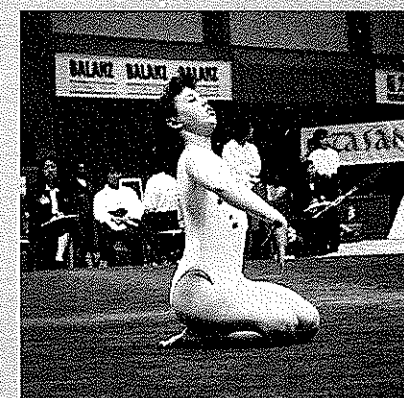
"I'm right up there with the others. It's just a matter of training that little bit harder."

"I've got the same chance as everyone else, but anything can happen. One of the girls who was in our World Championships team might get injured, and open up a place, or I might get an injury. But I think I have a good chance."

In her favour is her age. At only fourteen, she is still rapidly maturing as a gymnast, and closing in on the more senior members of the team.

She has also benefited from the coaching of former Soviet gymnastics coach Andre Rodionenko, now resident in Perth.

Another sixty eight elite Western Australian juniors from 21 sports are also being sponsored by the MLC scholarship program this year, worth \$91,000.

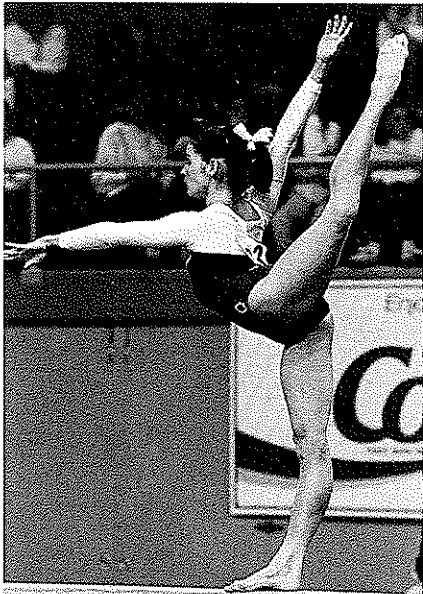

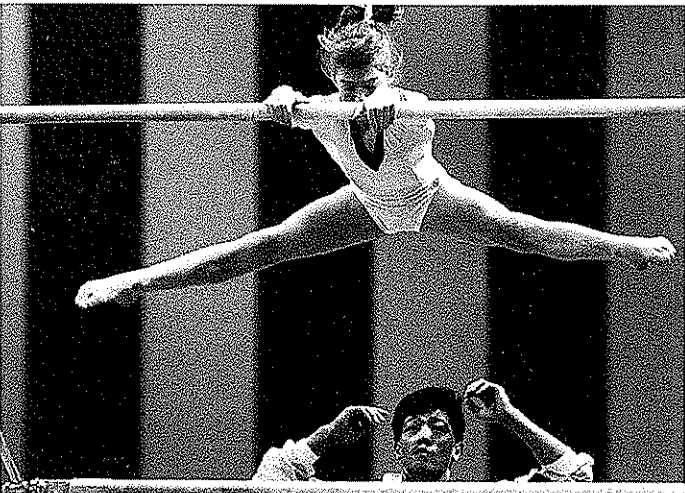
