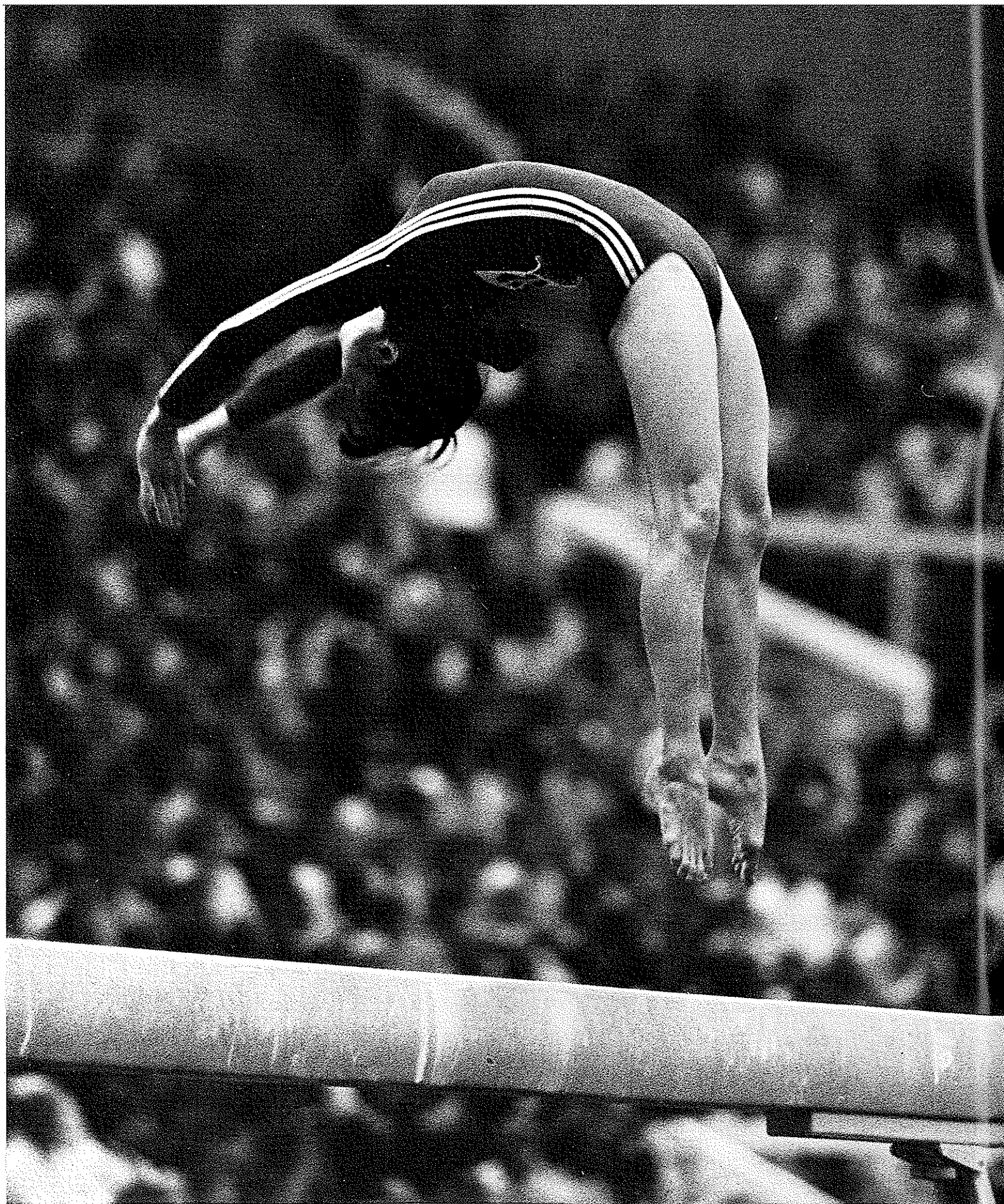

EDITORIAL

At the conclusion of a major event such as our recent World Championships, it is time to review the benchmarks achieved. Notable for Australia was the improvement in the women's rankings. The women proved that teamwork, consistency combined with neat presentations and tidy basics (i.e. legs together and straight) produced a good result. Congratulations to the team and to the Women's Technical Committee for addressing the problem of elite performance, which has seen this improved result.

For the other two disciplines, the results were as anticipated. However, the question re: depth and numbers was again brought to the fore. It is a challenge before the men and rhythmic, to address the issue before the 1987 Worlds which are our Olympic selection trials. Some programs such as "profile testing" are already in process. The results from this, combined with competition experience and clinics, should give a clearer indication of our depth in the next two years.

In general, the Artistic Worlds had other areas of concern. One was injuries, as six out of ten injuries during the competition were hospitalised. The F.I.G. Medical Commission is concerned and has requested specific follow-up information from the Federations involved.

Judging also appeared fairer and less political. Certainly, in the case of the women, with six judges, it was evident. In the case of the men, the changed attitude of the Technical Committee reinforced a fairer awarding of marks. There is still room for improvement but at least there was evidence that this was being tackled. It is an heartening benchmark for the gymnasts who drive so hard to achieve their personal best.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Once again another World Championship is behind us. The Australian gymnastic community can take pride in the accomplishment of our athletes, as virtually all performed up to their potential.

The Rhythmic Sportive Gymnastic Championships were held in Valladolid, Spain in very good circumstances, once you got used to the "Manyana" attitude of the Spanish. The volatile Latin crowd also added excitement to the event in the way they supported their home team.

There was a twenty day break between the R.S.G. World Championships and the Artistic World Championships, which were held in Montreal, Canada. The Championships themselves were preceded as normal by the F.I.G. Congress. The Montreal Velodrome surprisingly provided a very good venue for gymnastics, and though the crowd wasn't quite as enthusiastic as the Spanish, it was nevertheless a very successful competition and quite exciting for our team.

The F.I.G. Congress (including the Technical Assemblies for our four disciplines) will be reported on elsewhere, however, it would be remiss of me if I did not report that, over the many years I have attended, this Congress was one of the best. All Technical Committees with their better balanced membership seem determined to improve the image and the development of our sport. This was illustrated in the subsequent competitions with much improved judging. Similarly with the General Assembly, the Executive Committee with its much wider representation made the Federation Delegates feel comfortable with the programs and strategies that are being put in place.

I have been critical in the past of our performances at World Championship level. I believe that criticism was well founded and I am now happy to report positive improvements in all three competitive disciplines.

Firstly, the Men's Artistic Gymnastic program, which has always dominated our competitive performance, maintained its

profile despite morale sapping injuries. If losing Werner Birnbaum to a severe knee injury was not enough, we then lost our current National Champion, Robbie Edmonds at the third apparatus of the compulsory round, thereby meaning that all five scores would count for the rest of the 1A and 1B competition. This meant that all competitors had to perform to their personal potential if we were to maintain our position. It is now history that our team finished a very creditable 20th when compared to the improvement in quality of the competition. It was interesting to note that Federations such as Austria, Brazil and Sweden had all improved markedly over the last two years, whilst the U.S.A. had slipped from first in Los Angeles down to 9th position at these World Championships. It is also worth noting that had we had the services of both Werner and Robbie we would have only improved one team position to 19th. It is now obvious that our men compete in the toughest competition and will have to work even harder to achieve the Federation's top twelve teams goal.

Let me now turn to our Women's Artistic Gymnastic team who stamped their name most effectively on the competition. Previous teams have never quite lived up to mine and other's expectations in competition, but this time that expectation was fulfilled. The A.I.S., through its head coach Ju Ping Tian, had set a tremendous workload for our gymnasts with specific concentration on compulsory exercises. It has been a long held opinion that where you place in the compulsory round is more or less where you will place at the end of the competition, and this was borne out this time. Our team performed most creditably in the competition 1A or compulsory exercises and finished in 15th place and could have easily finished there, or just one place outside the magical 12 teams based on 1A scores. The optional round was also very good and the team slipped two places to Switzerland and, would you believe, Great Britain. This was most exciting and gave the Australians that were supporting our group a great deal of pleasure to know that we were so close to our target of the top twelve teams in World competition. To those officials who have persisted with the A.I.S., its program, the increased workload and all the things that go to making it a success, I extend my congratulations. Having bitten the bullet, we can now see success clearly, whereas in the past that view was rather occluded.

Finally, let me turn to Rhythmic Sportive Gymnastics where under the rules we were only entitled to three individual competitors plus a group. We sent two individuals and decided not to send a group on this occasion. The decision re the group was a wise one in that the standard of competition had gone up since 1983 and proved the point that we must have more specialist training for us

to succeed in the group event. The Four Continents Championship in Melbourne in October 1986 will give us an opportunity to present our group within Australia and to gauge how far off the international pace we are in this event.

With regard to the two individual gymnasts, both performed most creditably and gave us heart for the future.

Looking to that future, it is now obvious that with the 1987 World Championships and its consequent Olympic selection we have the capacity to have three male artistic gymnasts represent us at the Olympic Games should we attain 18th or better position on the listing whilst for the women the opportunity exists for us to qualify a team if we can get into the top twelve.

In the case of rhythmic gymnastics we should be in a position to send at least two individuals, but would have difficulty in qualifying a group should that event be included in the 1988 Olympic program.

International Travel Costs

The Board of the Australian Gymnastic Federation is often criticised for its inability to provide sufficient funding to cover the numerous overseas tours of our gymnasts, coaches, judges and delegates. This is an enormous cost that has increased over the years as our calendar of international events has broadened to include many junior development tours and more international invitational competitions for our elite gymnasts. It is a formidable contrast to the days when World Championships were the only international competition Australia sent gymnasts to. The A.G.F. is continually striving to seek assistance in this area, as exemplified below.

being put into action over the last couple of years and feel assured of your continued support in this area. However, we have one major area of concern.

We ask in particular that you consider the funding allocation for international travel relative to the "devaluation" of the Australian dollar compared to other currencies and the increase of airfares. For example, we were granted a sum of \$20,000 for international travel for 1984/85 which converted to \$US was a sum of \$16,946 when used, and the same amount for travel in 1985/86 which converted to today's rate is \$13,272. As you would understand to send a team of 27 personnel to our major event, the World Championships in North America, this sum allows us to totally assist only 3-4 people. As you would appreciate, the World Championships are the major event as this is where we receive our world ranking which subsequently affects our program relative to its sponsorship, public awareness etc.

We therefore request that when allocating monies to the Sports Development Program you are mindful to consider the fall in the Australian dollar relative to increasing airfares.

We place before you a suggestion, that perhaps our National airline, Qantas, could offer substantially decreased prices to bona fide National Sporting Associations. To date, they have been reluctant to offer anything but the going rate.

1985 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS OF ARTISTIC GYMNASTICS

November 3–10 1985. The Velodrome—Montreal, Canada

MEN'S COMPULSORIES

The Russian men, led by compulsory leader Vladimir Artemov, captured a substantial lead over all other teams. The Chinese, disadvantaged by drawing in the first session, where scores tend to be conservative, dropped to only fourth spot after the compulsory routines. In the evening session, Koji Gushiken and his Japanese team-mates, worked consistently to outscore the Chinese and moved into third spot. The unexpected result of the evening was the strong showing by the gymnasts from East Germany, led by Sylvio Kroll, who finished the compulsories in second place. The Russian men, scoring 293.15, seemed assured of the gold, outdistancing East Germany by 0.245. However, the battle for silver was hotly contested among East Germany, Japan and China, with only 1.25 separating the 2nd and 4th placed teams. The Americans, without most of the Olympic heroes of last year, dropped to 8th and faced an uphill battle to stay in the top ten. U.S.A. lost their third-ranked gymnast Daniel Hayden who dislocated his ankle, and therefore finished the team competition with only five men.

Among other teams, West Germany worked energetically to earn 5th place but faced stiff competition from Hungary and Cuba. The Cubans looked disciplined in their compulsory routines and appeared assured of a top ten position after the optionals. The South Koreans looked impressive in their drive to win a berth to the 1988 Seoul Olympics, but were not able to beat the French and Italian teams. The host team, Canada, amidst thunderous applause from the spectators, finished a respectable 12th place. The Swiss team, without its ace Joseph Zellweger, fell to 15th place. The Australian men lost their top ranked gymnast, Robert Edmonds, with a severed Achilles tendon during his floor exercise routine. With Werner Birnbaum back home undergoing knee surgery, the ill-fated Australian team only managed to outpace Denmark, finishing 20th out of 21 teams represented here in Montreal.

In the individual contest, Vladimir Artemov of the U.S.S.R., took a narrow lead from East Germany's Sylvio Kroll, scoring 59.10 to Kroll's 59.05. Pre-competition favourites, Li Ning and Tong Fei of China were 7th and 25th respectively after compulsories.

Koji Gushiken, the Olympic overall gold medallist, finished in 6th place but only 0.3 away from the 3rd place finisher and 1981 World Champion, Yuri Korolev. The young and graceful Valentin Mogilny of the U.S.S.R. was impressive at 4th place, and the veteran Koji Sotomura of Japan showed youthful vitality in placing 5th among the world's best teams.

WOMEN'S COMPULSORIES

The Russian women, led by the veteran Natalia Yurchenko, followed in the steps

of the Russian men by taking a commanding lead over second-place Romania, 195.9 to 193.45. In their last apparatus, the top girls were supreme. Out of the possible 50 points, their aggregate total of 49.725 stunned the audience with one flawless routine after another. It was as if one were watching an instant video replay—the sizes and shapes of the gymnasts being different but all exhibiting perfect control and beautiful form. Olga Mostepanova clinched the compulsory team title by scoring a ten (on the last event, balance beam). The only flaw for the seemingly invincible girls from Russia came unexpectedly on the uneven bars. Pre-competition favourites Natalia Yurchenko (1983 World Champion) and Elena Shoushounova (1985 European Champion) lost control, Natalia once and Elena twice. For almost any team, two major mishaps on one apparatus would seriously jeopardize its team placing; but such was the depth and might of the Russian women that nothing could topple them from reigning supreme.

The Romanians, sparked by Ecaterina Szabo, the Olympic silver medallist, worked consistently to capture second place. The machine-like precision of the Romanians, made world-famous by Nadia Comaneci, could not match the "gutsy" performances of the Russians. The Russians took that extra step necessary to become world champions. The East German girls, without their star Maxi Gnauck, tried reaching the top, and in the process achieved success and failure. The successes came on the uneven bars, where Gabriele Fahrnich climaxed a series of near-perfect routines by her team-mates to capture the first perfect 10 of the 23rd World Gymnastics Championships. The "nameless" East German women had found in Gabriele Fahrnich a successor to Maxi Gnauck. Fahrnich's 10 was a brave performance considering her earlier tragic and costly fall on the balance beam. Another East German girl, Jana Fuhrmann, followed the same fate as Gabriele. The two falls were costly to the East Germans, who had to settle for third place, just .575 behind Romania.

The Bulgarian women, competing in the first session at 8.00 a.m., managed to cling onto the top 4 spot and thereby were assured a place in the "main event" of the optional sessions. Borjana Stojanova, who had led continuously, had to settle for 10th place at the end of the compulsory competition. Czechoslovakia, which registered the second highest beam score, and the Chinese, which was the only team to better the Russians on the vault, displayed excellent technique to finish 5th and 6th respectively. The United States, without Mary Lou Retton and Julianne McNamara, could only manage a 7th place; but a ray of hope remained for Kelly Garrison, who scored a 9.775 on the beam. Hungary, Canada and Japan rounded out the top ten teams, in that order.

The Australian women performed admirably, placing 15th and only 0.2 behind the Swiss—180.275 to 180.475. They are to be congratulated for being able to average slightly more than 9.00 per gymnast, especially under the stiffer scoring system. Kellie Wilson was 1st for Australia at 65th, Debbie Graham, 83rd, Leanne Rycroft, 88th, Carolyn Stewart, 101st, Susan Turnbull 109th and Michelle Saliba 122nd.

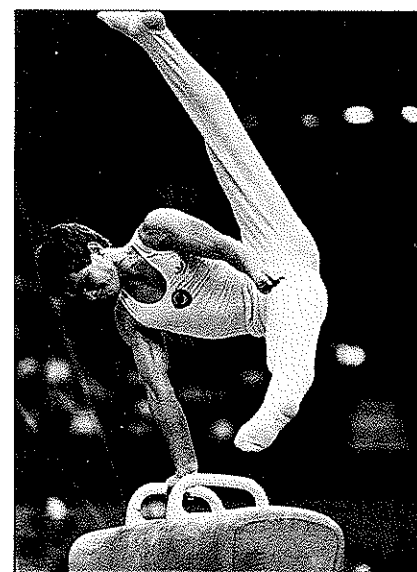
MEN'S TEAM

The USSR men held off the spirited Chinese to win the team title, 585.65 to 582.60. They were never really challenged by virtue of their almost insurmountable lead going into the optionals. In actuality, the Chinese beat the Russians in the optional session but not by nearly enough to overcome them. However, the Chinese needed to score well in the optionals to go past Japan and East Germany. In fact, if the Chinese had not competed so early in the compulsory session, there would have been a much closer race for the title, if not a reversal of the two places. At the start of the final session, East Germany, Japan and China were very close, but as the night wore on, it became obvious that the Japanese were losing ground in their quest for the medals. Their fourth-place finish meant that it was the first time in three decades that they had failed to place in the top three. Mr. Koguchi, the executive director of the Japanese Gymnastic Association stated, that "it was the worst possible fate imaginable". The youthful team from East Germany, especially Sylvio Kroll, performed with amplitude and daring, the two qualities essential for future success.

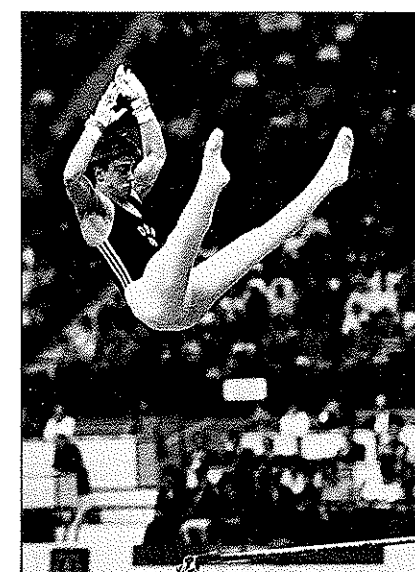
The new code of points has necessitated new and innovative approaches to artistic gymnastics. Tong Fei performed a double side somersault with three-quarter twist dismount on the high bar and rings. Lou Yun did the same skill on the floor. The crowd response, in spite of disappointing numbers in the score, was most appreciative. Audience reaction to superior routines and innovative variations of skills and combinations is the final stamp of approval and, judging from the 10 scored by Tong Fei on the high bar it must be safe to assume that crowd reaction can influence scores. Canadian Philippe Chartand performed a flyaway release to a regrasp on the ends of the parallel bars. The partisan crowd went wild and he was rewarded with a respectable 9.60. The new code will enrich artistic gymnastics to greater and more exciting heights. However, gymnasts and coaches must continually strive to take strict safety measures to insure the health of gymnasts.

The American men, who only last year gloried in their successful Olympic endeavour, tumbled to 9th place, behind Italy and Cuba. The Hungarians showed excellent one-arm work on the high bar, and the West Germans, who worked

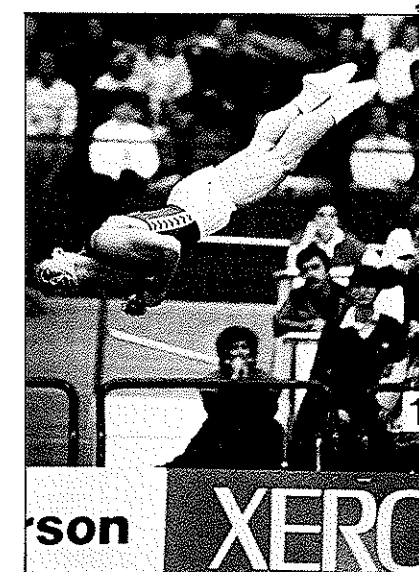

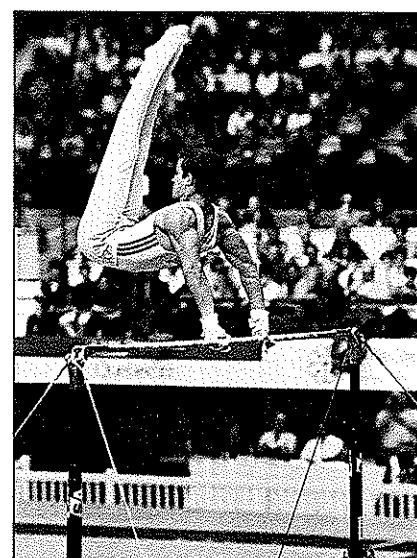
Yuri Korolev (URS) won the gold medal in the All-Around Competition



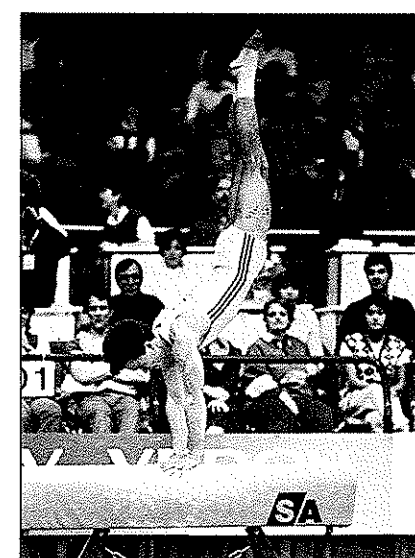
Sylvio Kroll (RDA) placed second in the high bar finals



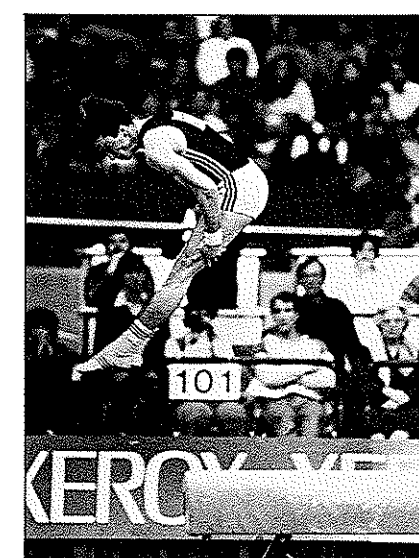
Lou Yun (CHN) finished equal second in the vault finals



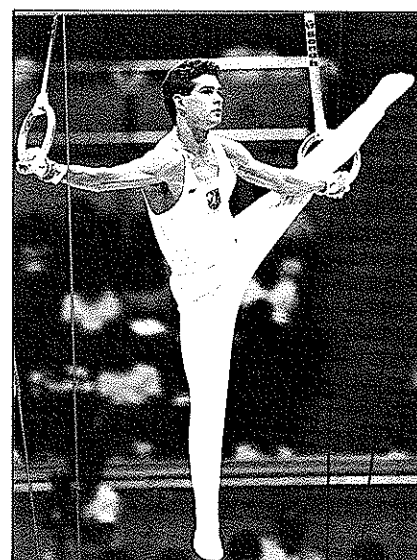
Valentin Mogilnyi (URS) scored an impressive 9.95 on high bar in Competition IB



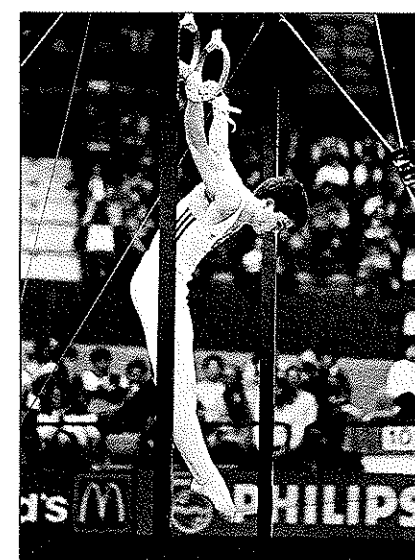
Vladimir Artemov (URS) finished 4th in the vault finals



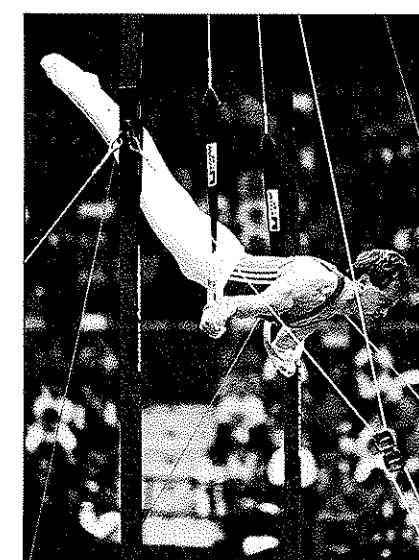
Jorg Hasse (RDA) finished equal 7th in the vault finals

consistently throughout, placed 5th and 6th respectively. From Scandinavia, the gymnasts from Sweden, led by a most talented lad named Johan Jonasson, surprised gymnastics enthusiasts by beating Great Britain for 16th place. The Swiss had difficulty recovering from their poor compulsory showing and had to settle for 14th place. The South Koreans, who will be battling to place in the top twelve in the 1987 World Championships, thereby winning a berth to the 1988 Seoul Olympics, performed somewhat spottily but demonstrated tremendous power in their tumbling to place 13th. The host team, Canada, cracked the top twelve to place 11th and the Bulgarians ended up in the magic 12th spot.

The Australian men began energetically but faltered in the second half. They are to be congratulated for performing under great pressure without their number one ranked Robert Edmonds. The top Australian finisher was Shaw Byng at 98th, followed by Ken Meredith 104th, Blaise Rizzo 109th, Grant Carlyon 118th and Minoru Yamasaki at 126th.

WOMEN'S TEAM

A new chapter was written in the evolution of women's artistic gymnastics. Oksana Omeliantchik, the Russian darling of this year's European Championships in Helsinki, stunned the audience with a breath-taking performance in her floor exercise. The crowd watched in awe as Oksana flipped and rolled like a "happy cricket", dancing to a most beautiful piece of Russian folk music, "chirping" away as though she was lighter than air. The innovative music and tumbling sequences that kept the audience in a state of continued enrapture, brought the house to a standing ovation. First, there was Olga Korbut, then Nadia Comaneci—now there is Oksana Omeliantchik. Needless to say, she received a 10. Elena Shoushounova, not to be outdone by team-mate Oksana, followed with a dynamic Mary Lou-type exercise, earning her and the Russian team another 10 points. The two exercises capped a night of total Russian domination that began with Vera Kolesnikova's 9.80 for her Yurchenko full twist vault. This Russian team may well have been the strongest team ever assembled with the likes of Natalia Yurchenko, Olga Mostepanova and another future star, Irina Baraksanova.

Ecaterina Szabo and Daniela Silivas of Romania turned in near perfect routines to lead the Romanians to a distant second place scoring 388.850 to USSR's 393.375. Silivas' floor, choreographed to a Texan hoedown piece of music, charmed the audience as Szabo continued to chalk up 9.9s in most events.

The East Germans, highlighted by Gabriele Fahnrich's 9.975 bar routine captured the bronze medal. Only .05 separated Bulgaria and Czechoslovakia, but that difference meant fourth place for Bulgaria,

and fifth for Czechoslovakia. U.S.A. and China were neck and neck throughout most of the evening, with the U.S.A. (led by Sabrina Mar) edging China by only .4 points.

The home crowd favourites from Canada, qualified three gymnasts into the all-around finals, but their efforts were not enough to beat the Hungarians. Japan, West Germany and Spain rounded out the top twelve spots among the world's best gymnasts. The standard of women's artistic gymnastics has improved dramatically. Coaches and gymnasts from other nations like South Korea, Italy, Switzerland, Great Britain, Australia and France will be working very hard to somehow crack the top twelve in the 1987 Rotterdam World Championships.

The Australian girls performed incredibly well and received accolades from almost every nation. Ju Ping is to be congratulated for moulding a team that worked hard for one goal, and one goal only—to WIN in Montreal. Although they lost two places to finish 17th among 23 countries, the future looks bright for the Australian girls. Individually, Kellie Wilson placed 60th, Debbie Graham 92nd, Leanne Rycroft 93rd, Carolyn Stewart 101st, Susan Turnbull 110th and Michelle Saliba 122nd.

Men's Individual All-Around Championship—Competition II

Before the Men's Individual Competition even began, it was evident that it would be an exciting and unusual competition: exciting because the top competitors were so close together and unusual because a Soviet (Vladimir Artemov) and an East German (Sylvio Kroll) were tied for the lead after Competition I, with the 1981 World Champion Yuri Korolev (URS) close on their heels, only .150 out of first place.

It took only the first rotation, however, before the medalist's positions changed, remaining so for the entire remainder of the competition—a fact strange in itself.

There were, gladly, no tens given to the men, and the scoring generally had to be considered **greatly** improved over that competition in the not too distant past. The first of the days highlights came from Li Ning (CHN) with his normally fantastic floor exercise. With astonishingly high tumbling and the now expected extension in every movement, the judges could not help but award him a 9.90. It was a shame that his otherwise perfect record for the day had to be shattered by a 9.35 for his pommel horse exercise which was unfortunately interrupted by a fall. With a mere 9.75 here, he would have tied with Korolev for the gold.

While Ning was on the pommels, the Soviet Valentin Mogilnyi performed a superb routine on the high bar with two extremely high consecutive Tkachevs, his form excellent throughout the exercise for a 9.95.

Halfway through the competition, Korolev, still maintaining a slight lead over

team-mate Artemov, did an excellent job on the high bar with his one armed giant swings to Markolev, straddled somi only adding to his superb dismount consisting of a double layout. He "stuck" the landing in every sense of the word for a 9.90.

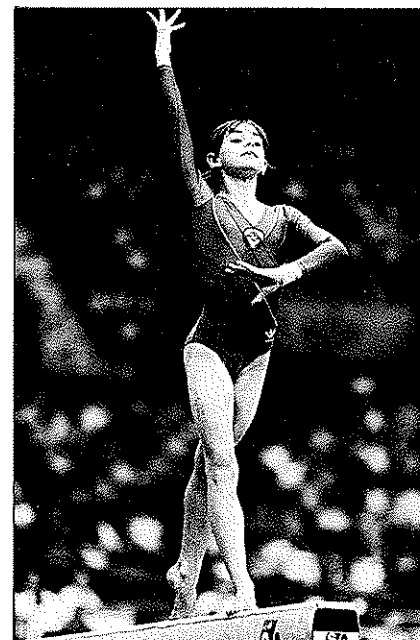
Throughout the entire competition, various other well-known gymnasts performed, receiving warm receptions from the large crowd at the Velodrome. The 1984 Olympic All-Around Champion Koji Gushiken (JPN) remained a favourite throughout, but could come only thirteenth in the overall standings, two below his place coming into Comp II. He seemed to have a major problem with his vault (9.00). It was almost as if he had hit the horse wrong, for his afterflight was very low and he landed on his knees and proceeded to roll to one side before soberly saluting the judges.

On his fifth event, the floor exercise, he seemed to be doing a commendable job, when, following his dismount, he could be seen **crawling** off the mat. As he received a 9.55, the dismount had been the major problem, but within minutes he could be seen refusing the wheelchair brought to him. Later he was surprisingly seen on pommels, but he came off once and could, after limping away from the equipment, receive only a 9.40 for his efforts.

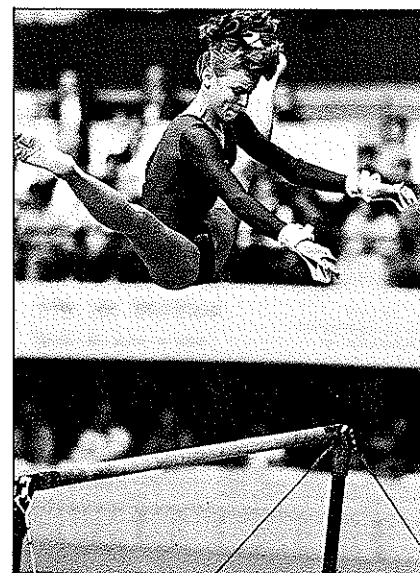
The American Team was not in peak condition for these World Championships. With only two members of their gold medal winning Olympic squad remaining, they were not expected to walk away with the entire competition, but few expected they would do as poorly as they did. Scott Johnson and Tim Daggett had perhaps not had as much time in the gym lately due to personal appearance, for as all know, that entire team is forever in great demand. One must give these two credit however, for staying with their sport while the remainder of the team retired and went into movies, television, writing and the like. Johnson did well on the high bar for a 9.80, and Daggett could receive the same on the pommel horse, but also fell below 9.00 on both parallel bars and the high bar.

The Canadians, on the other hand, put out some amazing performances in front of the home crowd. It was always known when Brad Peters of Philippe Chartrand came up, for there would be a tremendous roar from the spectators such as the kind usually reserved for the winners. It was a shame that neither made any of the finals, for each had strong exercises, placing fourteenth and eighteenth respectively. Brad had scores ranging from 9.50—9.75, while Philippe's lowest was a 9.30, his highlight for the evening being a 9.85 on his speciality, the high bar.

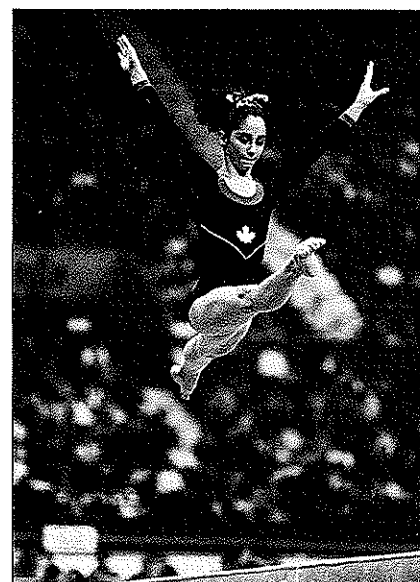
Had the scores not carried over from Comp. I, the second place winner would have been Tong Fei of China. He had no lower than a 9.70 the entire evening. On high bar he literally **flew** through the



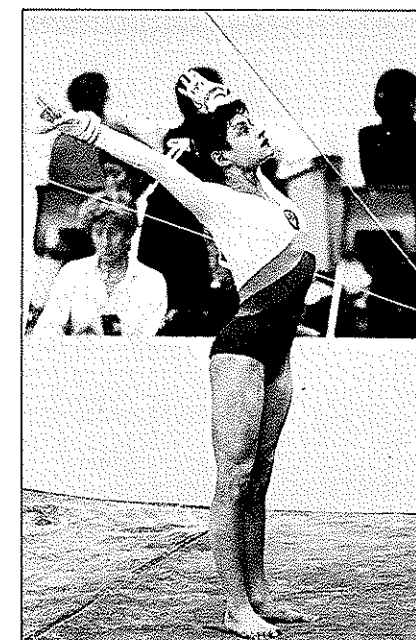
Oksana Omeliantchik (USSR) tied for Gold Medal



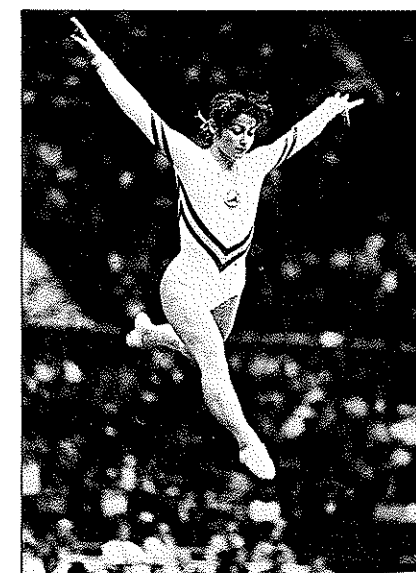
Olga Mostepanova (USSR) finished 3rd in Comp IB.



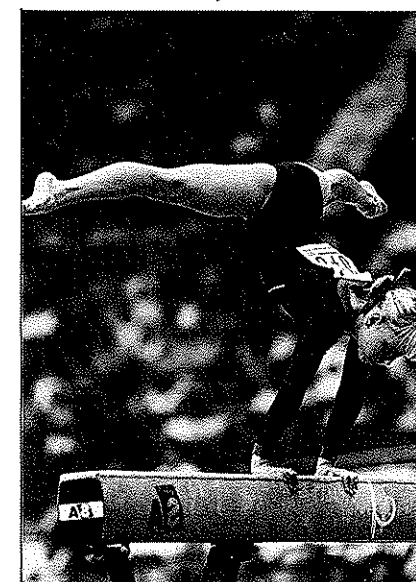

exercise with some of the highest release moves ever shown. His floor exercise contained a double side salto, a nice round-off to punch front somi and a series of butterflies with added twists, to end with a double back somi. The 9.90 given him by the judges drew loud disapproval from the audience, who perhaps wanted a 10.00. The competition drawing to a close, Tong could be seen no higher than seventh place.

As was stated earlier, the top three places never changed after the first rotation. Artemov had a solid evening, but was definitely aided by his previous scores. His extension on pommel horse is fantastic and earned him a 9.85, as did his vault. His other scores were all in the 9.70 and 9.75 range.

It was exciting to see Sylvio Kroll obtain the first ever overall medal for his nation in a World Championship. He fell from first to third, but surely he was not terribly disappointed. He is tall, 1.74m, and this gives him a beautiful line on events such as the parallel bars, but at the same time seems to hinder him on the rings. His idol is Roland Brueckner, past champion for East Germany. We can hope that he will do as well as his predecessor. He is only twenty-two years old and his progress seems to be steady, with improvement in each important championship. Perhaps he is the hope for an overall World Champion from the RDA.

This year's World Champion is none other than Yuri Korolev, who was 1981 World Champion as well. He was in the lead throughout all of Comp. II and never faltered. The handsome twenty-three year old has proven that even in today's competitive world of artistic gymnastics, it is possible to be married and raise a two year old son while still at the highest international level.

Women's Individual All-Around Championship—Competition II:

Before the Women's Overall Competition even began, a great deal of controversy surrounded the team from the Soviet Union, whose coaches had pulled Olga Mostepanova and Irina Barak-sanova out of Competitions II and III due to "injuries" sustained the day before. No reason was ever stated until after the competition had concluded, at which point the Soviet coach said both girls had aggravated old injuries. These girls were replaced with the two stars from the European Championships, Elena Shoushounova and Oksana Omeliantchik. The Soviets actually lost very little by the switch, for the first two had been in third and fourth places where the new girls were now fifth and fourth respectively. Of course, Mostepanova and Barak-sanova also had to be pulled out of their bars final, the only event in which either had qualified, and no other Soviet had been up to their standards in that event, thus it was a "Sovietless" final.

Gushiken, who was the favourite in the men's competition, it was Kati Szabo (ROM) the favourite in the women's, who was in the lead after the Team Competitions, with a slight lead over Natalia Yurtchenko (URS) and Dagmar Kersten (GDR).

Unlike the men's competition, the placing changed constantly and dramatically throughout the competition so that no-one was really sure who won until the last seconds, when the girls marched out to the medal ceremony.

Daniela Silivas (ROM) had one of the first rotations highlights with her 9.85 on beam. She has improved tremendously since the American Cup in March of 1985, and hopefully will continue to do so. Shoushounova earned 9.875 on her variation of the round-off vault.

By the third day of competition, some of the older girls seemed to be getting tired, an effect which seems to spur on, rather than hinder, the young newcomers. Although in the lead following the first rotation, Yurtchenko had faltered during her floor exercise to go out of bounds on her first tumbling run. This brought a 9.75, which can be considered low for her here. Szabo though did much worse. On the balance beam she does a front somi to almost immediate sit on the beam, only now she did not hit quite right and came off. She dropped all the way down to seventh place.

It is on floor where the little girls become the crowd favourites, and Silivas is no different—she is surely one of the smallest international competitors in senior competition today, and perhaps this helps in endearing her to the audiences everywhere. Her brilliantly choreographed exercise set to hoe-down music was an immediate success, earning the child a 9.90. Her older team-mate performed directly after her. She received a 9.85 and seemed to have introduced some new tumbling elements.

A few minutes later Omeliantchik was on the beam. On her second pass she completes three flip-flops, the last to two feet into immediate whip back. It was truly an amazing exercise, one that would have challenged even the Nadia Comaneci of Montreal in 1976. She scored only a 9.90 for this brilliant piece. Her team-mate was almost as spectacular on the event and received the same score. Her mount of a straddle planch is very pleasing to the eye.

Both girls did spectacularly on floor as well, again receiving identical scores, this time 9.975's. Whereas Elena's most spectacular run was a double layout, Oksana completed a triple twist to immediate punch front and at once does two passes, one immediately into the next, the second consisting of no run! It is truly amazing!

It seemed a foregone conclusion that one of the Soviet girls should win, but just which one was the question. That it was not Yurtchenko was obvious, for after

redeeming herself on vault with a 9.875, she fell from bars on her Deltchev combination and, scoring 9.125, could come only sixth. She was .20 behind Szabo who was, in turn, behind the fourth place finisher Gabriele Fahnrich (GDR) whose 9.975 on bars showed that she follows in her nation's tradition of excellence on the bars.

It was the third place finisher who did not cause too much attention. Dagmar Kersten (GDR) took after Kroll in winning the overall bronze for her nation. She is a spectacular performer and quite different from the harsh, static style which generally is seen by the German girls on floor and beam. As is to be expected, she scored highest on bars, but matched that 9.90 on beam as well.

And so who became Women's World Champion for the XXIII World Championships in Montreal? As has been stated before, it would be a close battle between the two Soviet newcomers. Obviously the judges could decide no better than the spectators who should be awarded the gold, for it became the first time in history that there was a tie for the Women's Overall Competition. The 1985 World Champions of Women's Artistic Gymnastics: Oksana Omeliantchik and Elena Shoushounova of the Soviet Union.

Men's Apparatus Finals—Competition III

The men returned to the competition arena on Sunday looking well after their "day of rest" during the Women's All-Around.

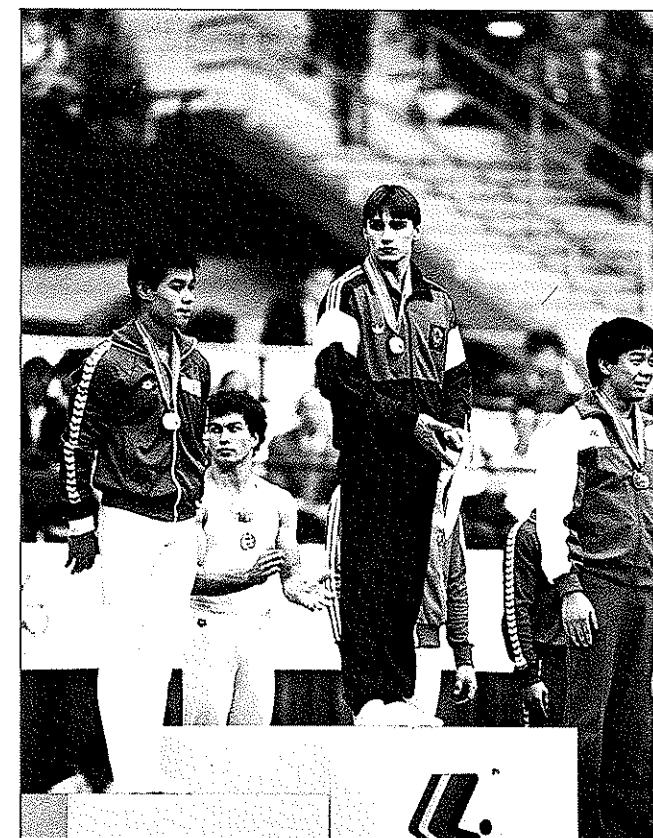
For the most part, all performances went extremely well, and although again there were no perfect scores, the audience wanted them, badly at times, and the scoring seemed very fair generally.

While Mogilnyi's 9.75 drew disapproval from the crowd, they soon recovered when Tong scored 9.90 for his spectacular floor exercises. He opened with a double side somi so high he seemed to soar into the rafters. His double back tuck to immediate punch front had the same effect, and even with his high score, the crowd wanted it higher. With such an exercise he had successfully defended his title from 1983.

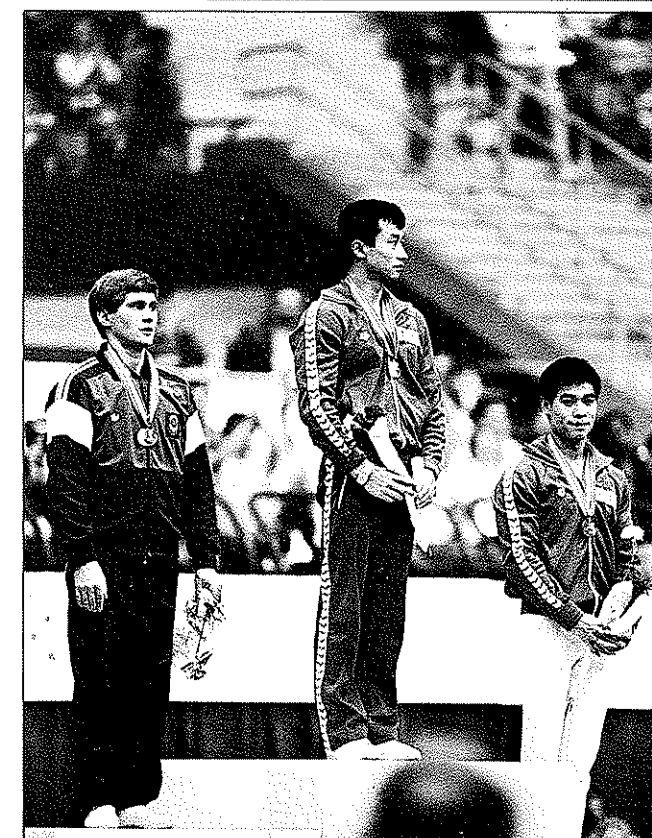
The crowd loved Korolev's double layout that led to silver, and Ning would have outdone or equalled Tong had he not gone out of line on his first tumbling run.

The pommel horse exercises were excellent, this event growing in excitement all the time. Most had unbelievable extension, with Mogilnyi and Ning both receiving 9.90's to take respectively the gold and silver medals. Japan's Hiroyuki Konishi was awarded the bronze.

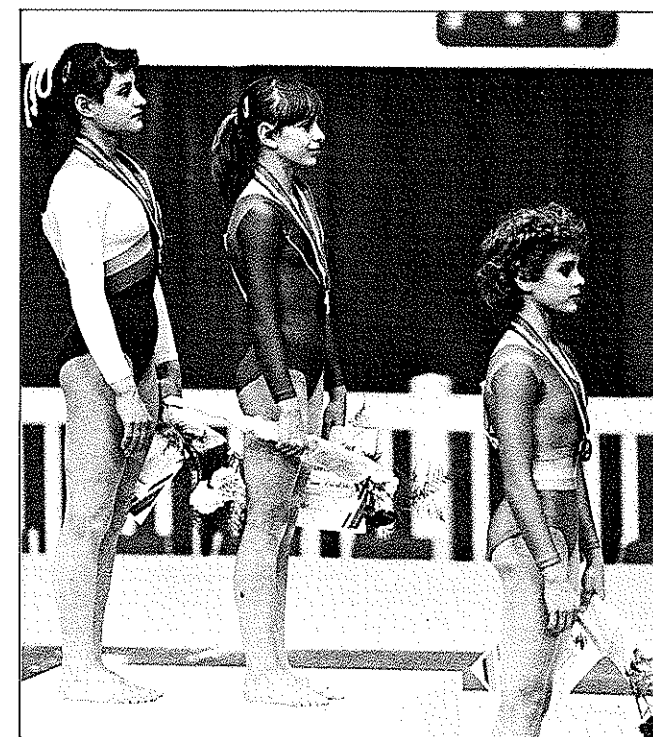
It was a happy moment indeed when it was decided that Li Ning would at last be receiving an individual gold medal as part of a World Championship, this for rings. He began with a roll to plance to an L-cross, and performed a 9.90 exercise with no movement to the rings whatsoever,



Pommel Horse Finals: L-R: Li Ning (CHN), Valentin Mogilnyi (URS), Hiroyuki Konishi (JPN)



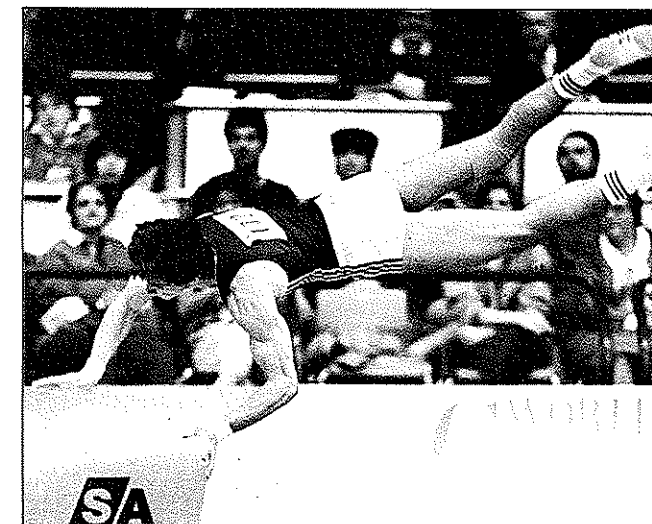
Floor Finals: L-R: Yuri Korolev (URS), Tong Fei (CHN), Li Ning (CHN)

dismounting with a double layout. Koji Yamawaki (JPN) and Yuri Balabanov (URS) tied for the bronze medal, the first with an original and difficult exercise scoring 9.80. The last performer was the World Champion himself. Yuri performed a solid exercise, but no-one, save the judges, knew exactly how difficult the exercise really was and thought he deserved a tie with Ning for the gold, and the audience let its feelings be known by protesting loudly for several minutes for what they felt to be an unjustly high score given to Korolev.

The crowd was given yet another opportunity to hear the Soviet national anthem when Korolev won the vault after a front double pike and a one-armed layout vault. Lou Yun (CHN) and Laurent Barbieri (FRA) each took a silver, and the Frenchman was surely one of, if not the, happiest recipient of a medal of the competition.

The only man to qualify for every event had thus far failed to finish among the medalists, but this changed when Kroll took the gold for his beautiful parallel bars set with 9.90. Equal to him was Mogilnyi, while the favourite Gushiken must have decided he could not leave what would probably be his final World Championships without a medal. So, he went all out and, scoring a 9.90, received the bronze. Only .025 behind was Artemov, who, despite qualifying for four finals, came away only with three fourth place finishes and a fifth.

The high bar is always the most spectacular of men's events, so why should Montreal have been any different? Mitsuaki Watanabe (JPN) was first and came away with the bronze medal. His full twisting double back dismount was an excellent compliment to the rest of the exercise for a 9.90. Tong had a tough act to follow, but did so wonderfully for a 9.95 and the gold. Kroll took silver with a fantastic routine containing the highest releases ever caught, including a one armed re-grasp. It was a shame that such a spectacular competition had to end with Balabanov falling on a piked somi release and to land on the bar still in the straddle position from a reverse hecht. He scored only an 8.60.

It was, nonetheless, a spectacular event, and one can only wonder at who of the many new start will re-appear in Amsterdam in 1987, and who will replace the old faces to whom we have grown accustomed.

Women's Apparatus Finals—Competition III

Whereas the men had had a day off between Competitions II and III, the women did not, and so it is surprising that more did not show the fatigue which would come from such a strenuous week.

The newest, or rather most popular vaults of these championships were those with a round-off onto the board, done in

many different variations. Shoushounova took the gold with her two Yurtchenko's, one a layout full, the other a layout 1½. Szabo seemed to lack distance, but scored well for the silver followed by Kersten with her piked Cuervo and tucked Tsukahara. It seems that about the only person not to have mastered the Yurtchenko was Yurtchenko herself, for she could only average 9.563 and a tie for sixth place.

The uneven bars was an interesting final, for the mere fact that not a Soviet was there, if for nothing else. Surely this does not happen often, no matter what the circumstances. Fahnrich took the gold with a 9.950 in finals and a preliminary score of 9.988. Her round-off mount over the low bar was very nice and her Jager salto was extremely high. Kersten took the silver and Hana Richna (TCH), who had been having a very good competition, the bronze.

The beam finals, while they saw some of the best performances of the night, also saw many of the worst, for of the eight finalists, four came off the piece of equipment that seems to haunt so many. Szabo was one of the fortunate here though, for from her press to handstand to her round-off double back she faltered not once. She had not been as happy as she was at that moment for a long time, nor had been her coach. She earned the silver and Shoushounova the bronze, despite almost falling twice. Both Kersten and Yurtchenko came off, but it was the last performer, the miniature Silivas who earned a 10.00 to capture the gold medal. Her excitement was most enjoyable to behold.

Still happy about her success on the beam, Szabo went all out on floor to earn a 9.875. Shoushounova followed with her brilliant exercise of a 9.95 and the silver and Silivas was just a little lower for a 9.90. Ulrike Klotz (RDA) came just ahead of her to take the bronze by .062. Omelantchik came away with a 10.00 for her perfect exercise not much different from that in Comp. II.

And this little girl from Kiev earned not only a gold medal but the **World Gymnastics Magazine** cup for "Most Charming Gymnast of the XXIII World Gymnastics Championships" and left Montreal as one of the two gymnasts (Shoushounova being the other) from whom the world hopes for as the next star.



AUSTRALIAN S.T.C. AT WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Australia was honoured to have Anne Bigham as one of the four Scientific Technical Collaborators (S.T.C.) at the Artistic World Championships.

During the competition, Anne was STC on floor for competition 1B, vault for competition 2, and on vault, beam and floor for competition 3. She found it a valuable learning experience to sit with the Head Judge on each apparatus and to be able to assist with advice at times. As part of the STC studies, the four STCs evaluated all of the routines on bars, beam and floor after competition 1B. Anne had the opportunity here to learn about with is 'paid' and 'not paid' when elements are borderline, and when bonuses could be awarded.

Anne made some interesting observations regarding pre-competition training; the countries which ranked highest were very serious in their approach to training—emphasizing perfect technique, consistency of performance, excellent form, and at the end of each session, they did strength and stretching. Most teams worked full routines for the week prior to the Championships, and each team trained 4½ hours each day.

From watching the Soviet gymnasts, Anne learned that they avoid the gymnast's building up bulk muscle by immediately stretching the muscle group which has just been exercised for strength improvement. These girls all looked trim, fit, were obviously very strong and were in a class of their own. They did many repetitions of sticking of landings off the apparatus—especially the back salto from stand on the horse to land on solid mats. Slight over-balances of steps were not tolerated by the coaches. These girls were not spotted during training.

The countries which ranked highest—USSR, Romania and East Germany, were obviously ready to compete, and just performed full routines. The lesser nations were still doing combinations of skills, part routines and needed spotting for the more difficult skills.

We look forward to Anne passing on her newly acquired knowledge to other Australian judges.

RHYTHMIC WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS Valladolid—Spain 1985

Spain's ancient Castillian city—Valladolid—known also as the heart of Rhythmic Gymnastics in that country, hosted the twelfth World Rhythmic Championships.

Prior to the commencement of the competition, the delegations were taken to a bull fight and a medieval castle. Along with the barren nature of the countryside, these provided a contrast to the soft beauty of the gymnastics yet to be seen.

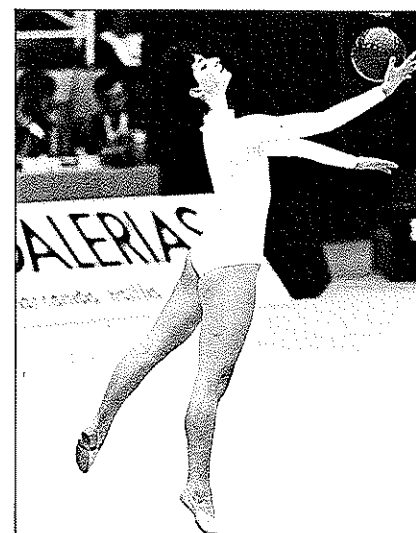
Thirty-five nations, involving 93 individuals and 21 groups, participated.

After the first day of the individual competition (in which gymnasts competed in only two of four events) the three Bulgarians showed their superiority by finishing in first and equal second places. Four other gymnasts were vying for these places: the three Soviets and one East German. The competition amongst these seven was so close that only 0.2 of a point separated them.

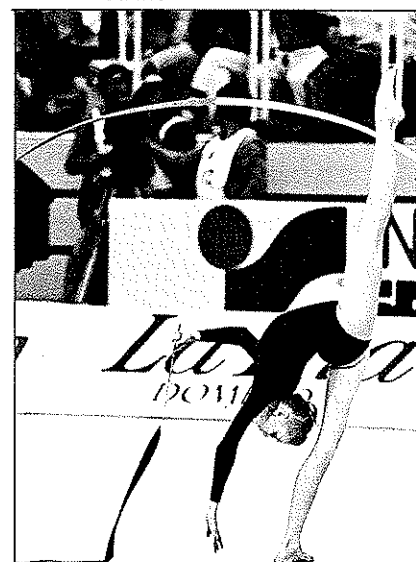
Also in the first day of competition came an unusual ruling. The Spanish audience was enthusiastic and noisy, so much so at one point, that one gymnast remained for a lengthy period on the floor waiting to start her routine. She was unable to do so because she could not hear the music as the Spanish crowd continued to applaud and shout in response to the mark given to the previous Spanish gymnast. The International President, Yuri Titov, warned that any further prolonged cheering would result in the Spanish gymnasts being penalised. Needless to say, calm was restored.

On the second day, the Bulgarians continued to perform with consistent brilliance. Dilianna Gueorguieva was exceptional. She had altered some of her routines we saw at the Australia Games and increased the difficulty. Her teammates, Bianka Panova (who also came to the Australia Games) and Lilia Ignatova, proved that with no execution faults in difficult routines, the medals are yours. The Bulgarians dominated, with Gueorguieva taking the gold medal, with a score of 39.90, Ignatova taking silver with 39.80 and Panova claimed the bronze with 39.75.

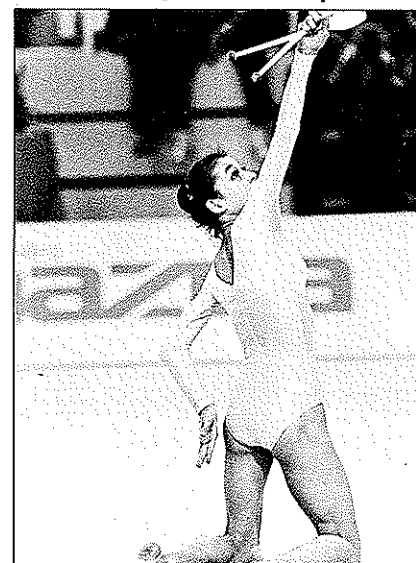
The three Soviet gymnasts, in particular the beautiful Galina Beloglazova, and the other two who also participated in the Australia Games, Marina Lobath and Tatiana Drouchinina, followed close on the heels of the Bulgarians. The Soviet gymnasts who had difficulty, originality and beauty, unfortunately made small execution errors which cost them the medals. Beloglazova has grown into a mature young woman and, combined with the grace and physical beauty, she was stunning on the rhythmic floor. It was a disappointment that the execution errors

Marina Lobath (URS) scored 9.90 for her ribbon routine in the A-A Competition



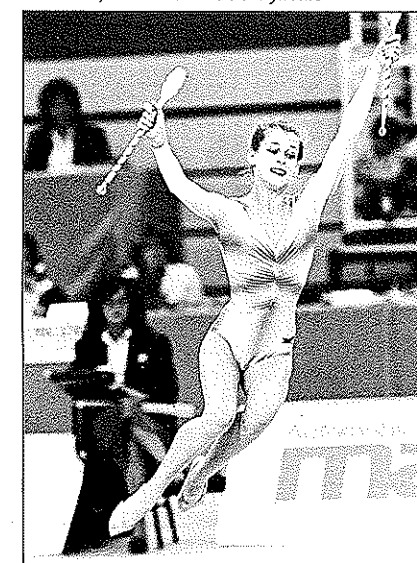

were so costly. In the all-around competition, Beloglazova finished 4th, followed by Drouchinina in 6th place, and Lobath 7th. All three gymnasts featured in the individual apparatus finals: Lobath took the silver in the rope finals, Drouchinina took bronze on clubs, and Beloglazova finished equal first with Panova in the ribbon final.

Lori Fung, the Olympic Games Champion, had a good, consistent competition, and finished with a score of 38.95, in 9th place. It was a credit to her that she did come back to a World Championship and perform so well.

The two Australian girls, Antonietta Guida and Nicole Higham, both from Perth, finished their first World Championships with good performances. Antonietta finished in 67th place with a score of 36.40, and Nicole finished in 85th place with a score of 35.50. Because of Antonietta's above 9.0 points average score she will receive the International Gymnastic Federation's elite gymnasts pin. The second day of competition was better for both Australian girls who handled the international competition well.

The 21 groups competed over the first two days for their placings in the finals, and again the Bulgarians dominated. After the first day the precise Bulgarian routine was in first place and in a surprising equal second were the Spanish and the Soviet gymnasts. In 1983, the group from the Peoples' Democratic Republic of Korea were crowd favourites in the group routine, and again they appealed to the crowd as they finished on the first day in 4th place. The Spanish crowd was stirred by the North Koreans who wished to have people on side with regard to their marks, but the crowd was torn with their loyalty to the Spanish, plus cheering for the North Koreans.

On the second day of the presentation of the group routine, Bulgaria maintained its lead. The Soviets proved that they were again second to the Bulgarians and finished alone in second place, with the North Koreans managing to come up into third, and the Spanish falling to 4th place.

It was heartening to see a nation like Norway finishing in the finals for the group routine and particularly when Australia will be visiting that country in the coming year.

On the third day, which was the final presentation of eight groups, the Bulgarians proved too strong, and received a perfect score, and consequently won the gold medal. In another turn around for the other places, the silver medal was shared between the very elegant Soviet gymnasts and the crowd pleasing dramatic group from the Peoples' Democratic Republic of Korea. They had finally broken through the barrier and were now in the medals game.

In the individual finals, the Bulgarian gymnasts continued to dominate and finished with eight out of a possible 12 medals in the finals competition. Diliانا Gueorguieva of Bulgaria proved why she dominated the competition and retained the title of World Champion, by taking three out of a possible four gold medals. She received the gold medals for her dramatic rope routine, and shared the gold medal twice with her team-mate Lilia Ignatova, once for her ball and once for her clubs. The ribbon gold was also shared, this time between Bianka Panova, also of Bulgaria, and the very beautiful Galina Beloglazova. Because of the first place ties, only one silver medal was awarded, and this went to Marina Lobath for her

rope routine. Bronze medals were awarded to Lilia Ignatova for rope, Galina Beloglazova and Bianca Ditrch of the Democratic Republic of Germany for their ball routines, and Tatiana Drouchinina for her clubs. The last bronze medal went to Diliانا Gueorguieva for her rope routine. Obviously the judges were impressed with the elegance and execution of the routines as nine perfect scores were awarded.

What has to be exciting for the Australians, is the fact that of the six top gymnasts, four were in Australia for the Australia Games. How exciting it has been to see the rhythmic gymnasts, the best in the world, first hand.

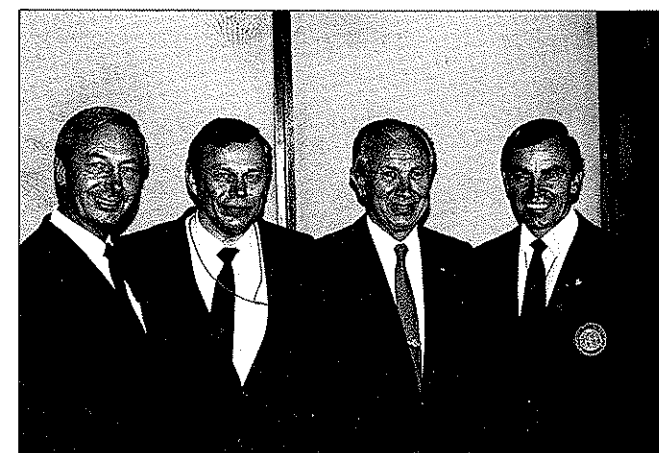
All three Italian gymnasts who had visited Australia, either during Australia Games or for National Championships, competed at the World Championships. Their results were: Giulia Staccioli—29th place, Annalisa Bianchi—35th and Cristina Cimino—38th.

Also in attendance at the Rhythmic World Championships was the President of the I.O.C., Mr Juan Antonio Samaranch. He attended two days of competition, and also gave a press interview. Naturally, he was asked about the inclusion of the group routines into the Olympic program, and responded by saying it was certainly under consideration. With Spain bidding for the 1992 Olympic Games, and with the Spanish group having such a good result, it augers well for the inclusion of group routines into the Olympic Games program.

Through very stirring march music, composed specifically for the World Championships, the closing ceremony was held and the 12th Rhythmic World Championships were over.

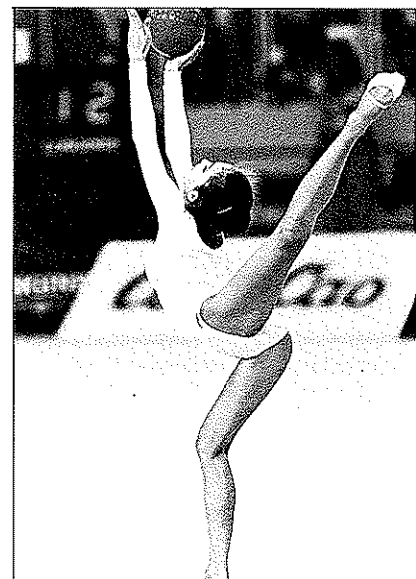

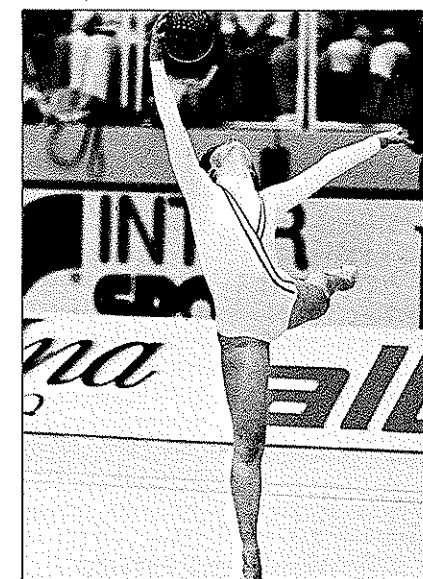

At first, her talent for gymnastics is simply an outlet for her energy, but then it enables her to create her own identity and she is hooked! 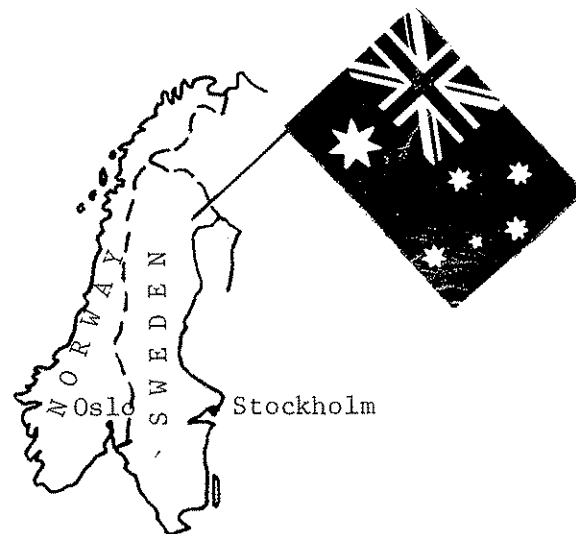
INTERNATIONAL COMPETITIONS

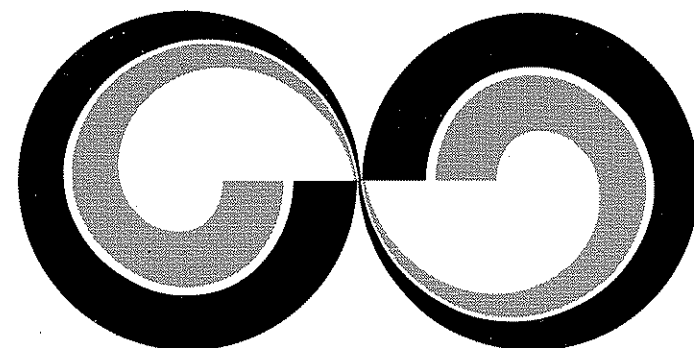
This development has also made Herning Denmark's biggest exhibition town, as well as an industrial, cultural and educational centre.

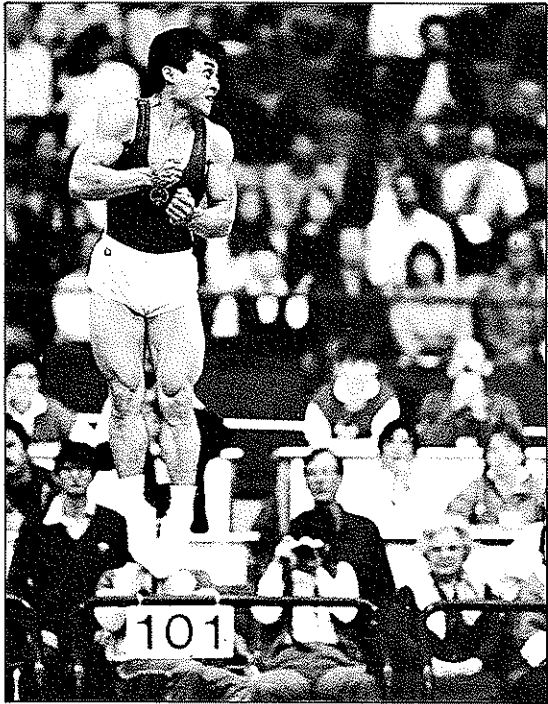

- **WHAT IS GYM FUN?**

For each level passed an attractive cloth badge and wall certificate is available. Your instructor will give you more information about the "Award Set".

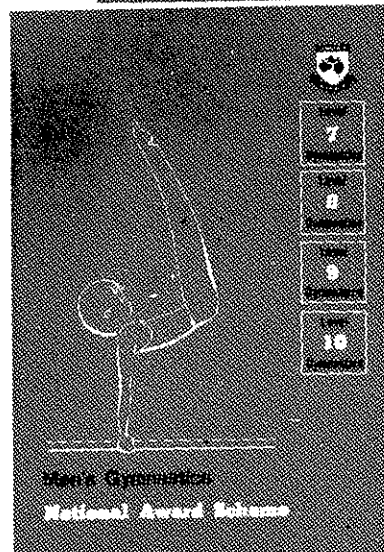
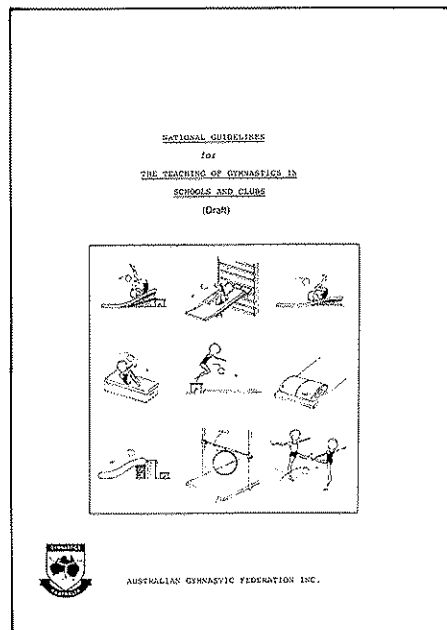
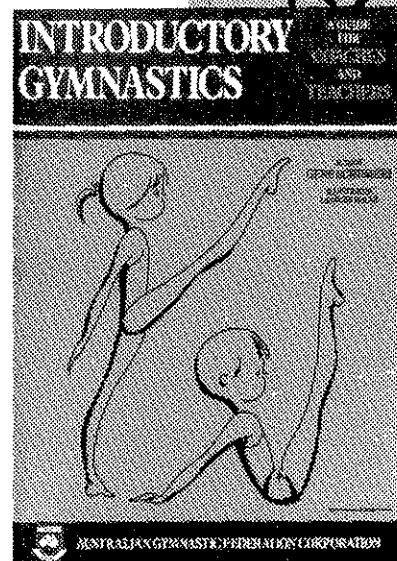
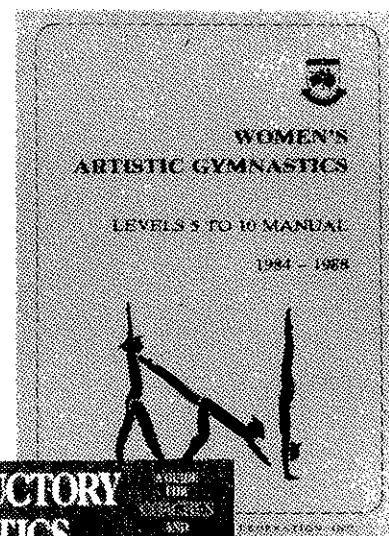
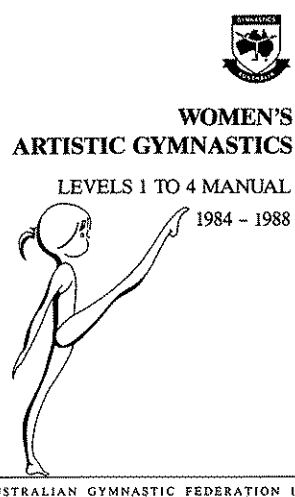
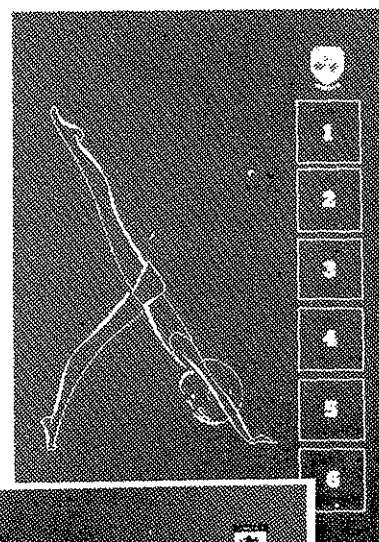
