

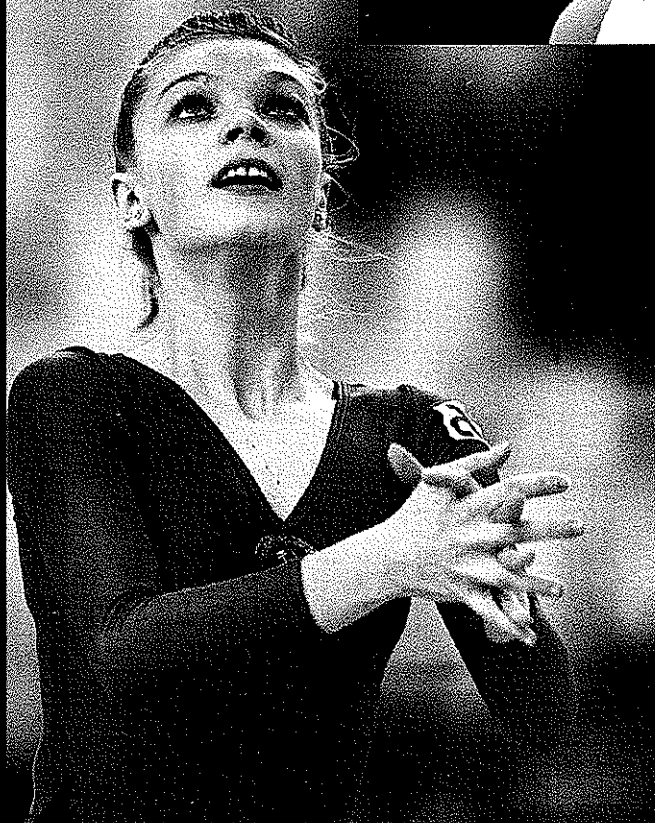
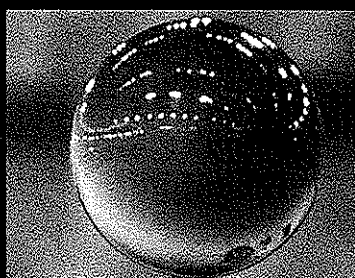

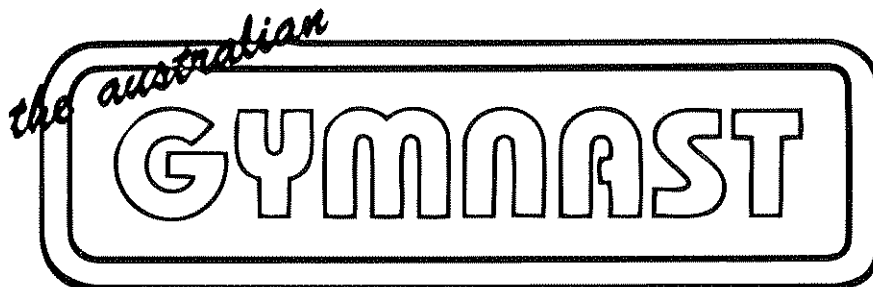

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT



As we near the end of the Olympiad and reflect on the goal achieved by the Women's Artistic Discipline, it is the opportunity and time for the Federation to review its Four Year Development Plan and set new goals for the next Olympiad and beyond.

When the Federation first received Federal Funding in 1978, it was a requirement to produce a Five Year Development Plan. How difficult that exercise was to try and project into the future when there was no existence of an Institute or Institutes of

Sport or guaranteed funding as has happened to date. The challenges before the Federation then seemed enormous but on reflection the achievements to date that are based on that Development Plan make the challenges of maintaining, consolidating and still achieving seem just as enormous as the small steps we took in the early days.

There is no substitute for planning and to this end I applaud the Federation's exercise in having specific meetings which will address the areas of technical, administration and marketing. Views and expertise will be canvassed as widely as possible to ensure a productive session and each stage will be completed and incorporated in the Federation's plan.

It is an exciting time and a wonderful opportunity to put forward our dreams and the method with which to obtain them. We have been fortunate to have visionaries in our Federation both in the administration and technical area and we trust that with vision and dreams plus learning from our experiences we will once again be able to go out and fight for Gymnastics and its development.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT



On the night the Australian team celebrated the fantastic sixth place finish of our Women's team in Indianapolis one could be forgiven for a big sigh, when Ju Ping Tuan spoke to me about her place for 1996 and 2000, but that is what gymnastics is about! Long term or strategic planning by various levels of identified talented gymnasts.

Since we have arrived home we have had a preliminary strategy meeting in Canberra with the

Artistic Technical Directors, The AIS Head/National Coaches, the President and the Executive Director. Had discussions with the Australian Institute of Sport and made a presentation to the Australian Olympic Committee on our forward plans, after discussing our 1992 prospects.

This long term planning is not new, but most authorities with which we are associated now understand our strategy and the fact that our women gymnasts in particular do not retire early through burn out of injury, but rather they are victims of the Technical Coaching that makes their successors more biomechanically efficient and more able to master the advanced elements.

The 1996 Artistic Gymnastics Olympic Team will qualify at the 1995 World Championships in Sabae, Japan. The squads of talented potential members were identified by the Men in 1989 and they have

approximately 30 boys identified over three levels and throughout Australia in our High Performance or Intensive Training Centres. The recent MAG Junior Championships in Perth at Under 12, 14 and 16 years testify to the available talent.

In the case of the Women these were identified in 1990 and they have squads in place over three levels that number in excess of 80 talented gymnasts.

For the record our Rhythmic Sportive Gymnastics Technical Committee are addressing their plans for High Performance Centres and developmental squads will be introduced with an intermediate goal or objective to perform creditably at the 1994 Commonwealth Games in Victoria, Canada.

To also speak of the 2000 squads is rather hard to comprehend, but in our sport to succeed it demands that level of planning and commensurate dedication from the gymnasts. Again for the record the 2000 squads will be identified by the Men '91 - '93 and the Women '93 - '95. That is the strategy and the price of success.

Along with these elite development plans we also must formulate all the other levels in the spectrum of gymnastics that cater for all disciplines, three competitive and the fourth recreational gymnastics. The Technical Committees will meet later this year to prepare these revised development plans. When complete these plans will provide the basis for all development for the next Olympiad.

At the next Board Meeting of the Federation we will be appointing a Marketing Consultant which hopefully will round out our key personnel to fulfil the objectives of this next Olympiad.

Sound planning is essential, however without the financial support we will not attain our objectives. It was only by making our Womens programme a financial priority, ahead of the Mens programme and to the detriment of the Rhythmic programme, that they succeeded. The next Olympiad and its priorities is now the challenge.

MEN'S ALL-AROUND

A Soviet sweep of the medals would not be a surprise outcome for the Men's All-Around Competition. The only question was which athlete would place in which medal position.

All three Soviet men, Misutin, Scherbo and Liuken, began well. Misutin had a great rings exercise for 9.85 and took an early lead. His exercise showed classic Soviet style and fantastic strength.

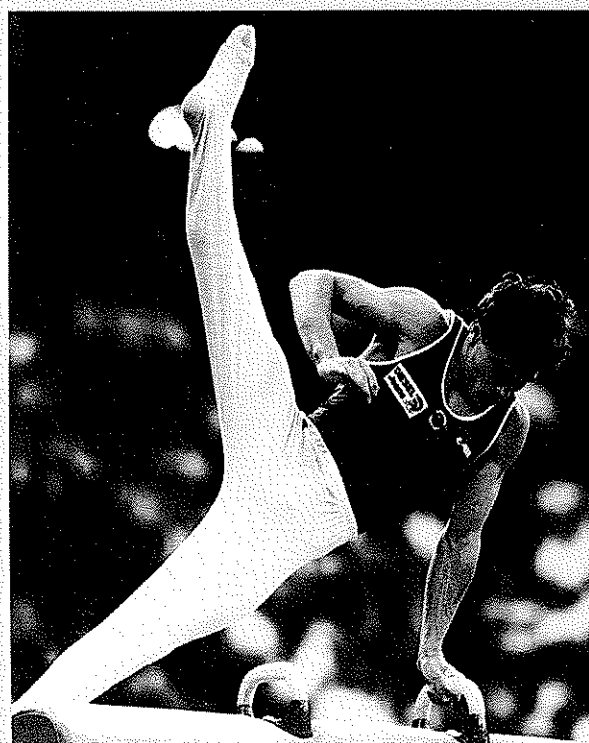
Throughout the evening the battle for the gold remained between Misutin and Scherbo. Liuken would hold onto his third position from the team competition although one wonders how he might have fared had he not injured his Achilles heel on only the second event of the evening. That event, high bar, was also his best with a 9.90 and a high triple back off.

Xiaoshuang Li of China was content with his fourth place finish and was one of the most consistent gymnasts of the evening. He posted all 9.7 variations save a 9.525 on a rather weak vaulting attempt.

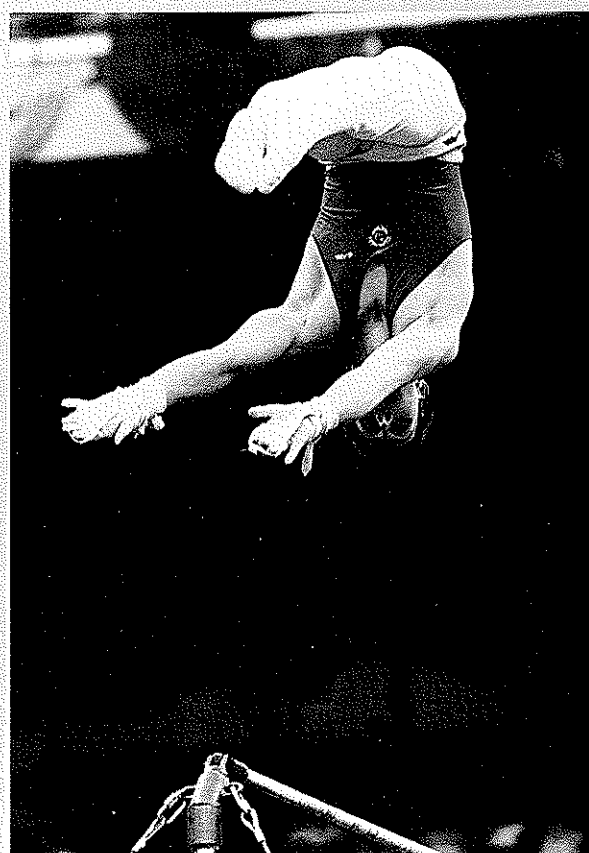
Overall the scoring in the men's competition was not high and not nearly as close as were the women's scores. Seemingly the men's judges were doing their job and not inflating the scores, as we saw in the women's portion of the event. But perhaps the women really were much closer than the men. Certainly there are different levels of performance during different years, and it could be that this was a lower level year for the men.

Some surprises of the men's competition included a tie for 5th place between Italy's Yuri Chechi and Germany's Sylvio Kroll. Chechi proved once again that he can challenge the best in the world and is without a doubt the champion of western Europe. Kroll had a good day also but was a bit inconsistent, as his scores ranged from a low 9.475 on floor exercise to a 9.80 for a beautiful high bar exercise with two one-armed giants to Gienger and a straddle Jaeger, both with superb form and lines.

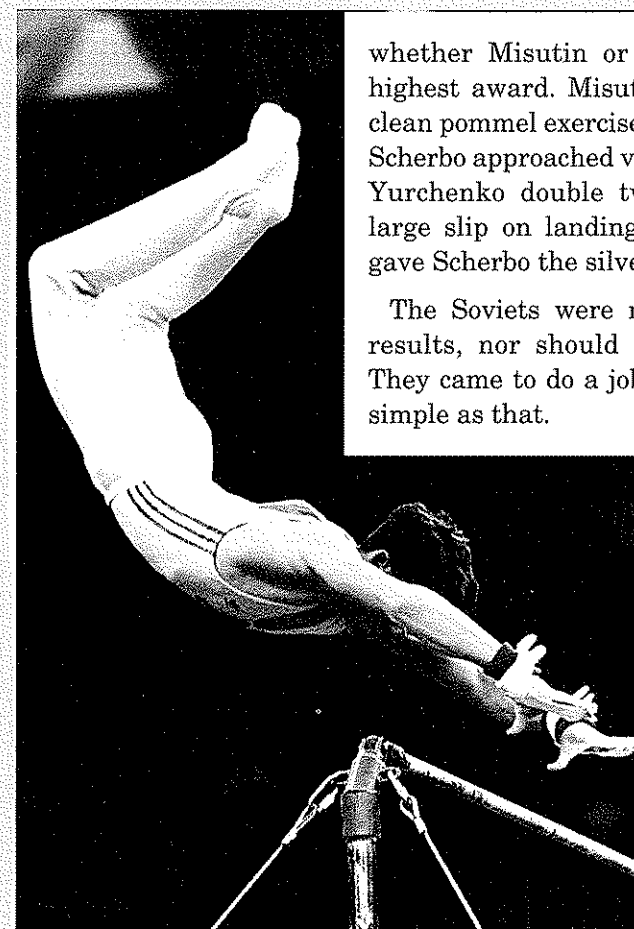
At the end of the evening, it was the three Soviet men who mounted the medal podium. Into the last event it was still a question



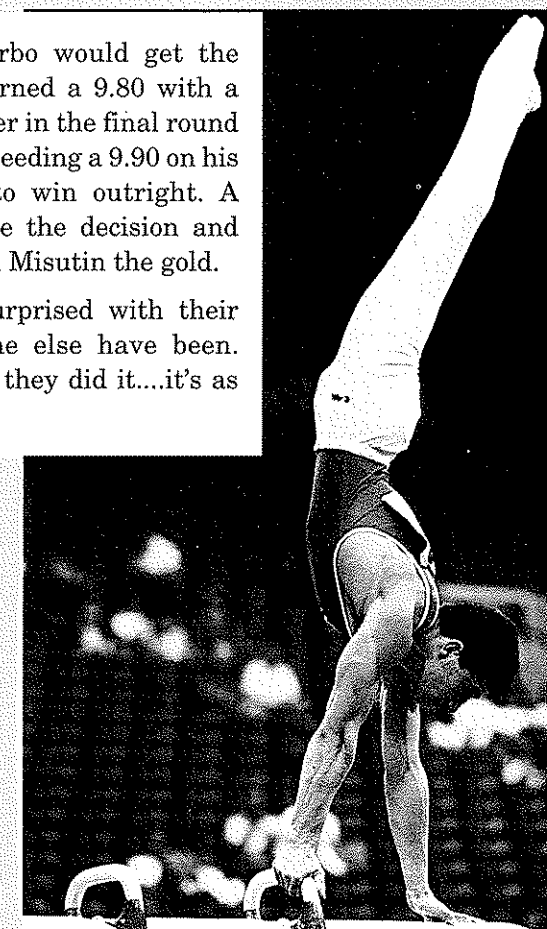
Valeri Liuken, USSR



Vitali Scherbo, USSR



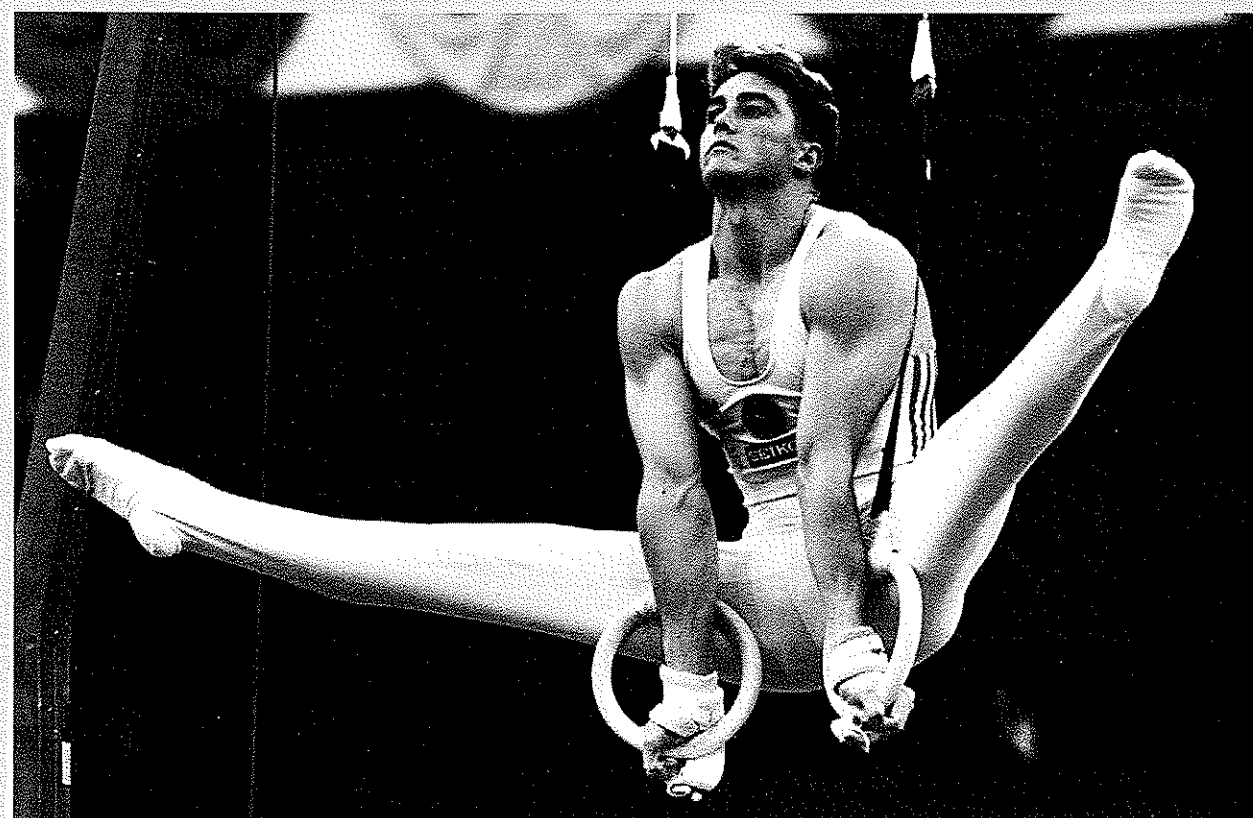

whether Misutin or Scherbo would get the highest award. Misutin earned a 9.80 with a clean pommel exercise. Later in the final round Scherbo approached vault needing a 9.90 on his Yurchenko double twist to win outright. A large slip on landing made the decision and gave Scherbo the silver and Misutin the gold.

The Soviets were not surprised with their results, nor should anyone else have been. They came to do a job and they did it....it's as simple as that.

WOMEN'S ALL-AROUND

Unlike the previous night, no one could be sure which National Anthem would be heard at the conclusion of the evening's gymnastics. Would it be the Soviet Union, Romania or....the United States?

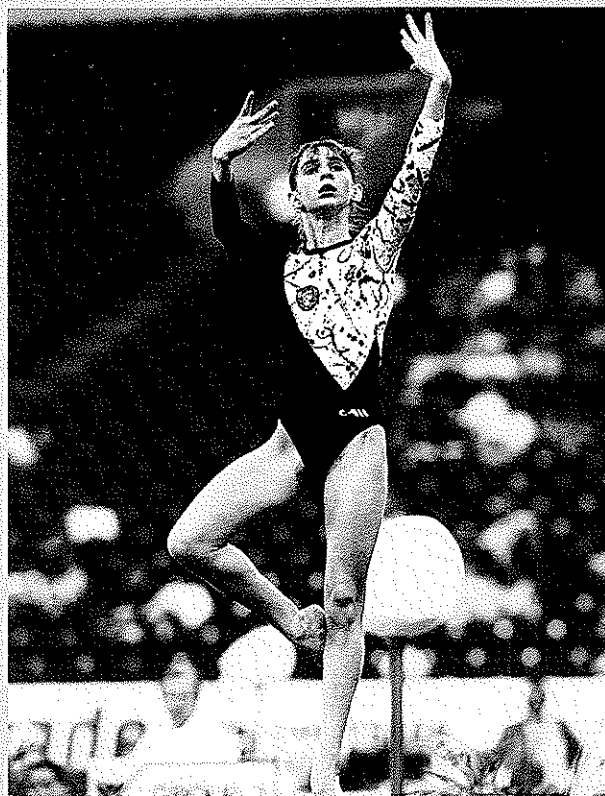
From the very beginning the three American girls proved their Competition I scores had been no accident. There were more Americans in the top eight finishers than Soviets and an equal number of Romanians. Surprising perhaps, but nonetheless, these American girls displayed great capabilities.

Led by Kim Zmeskal, new World All-Around Champion, several have said the Americans received unfairly high marks on occasion. But perhaps an ideal location close to home, a supportive crowd and some great gymnastics, with few mistakes, had something to do with this.

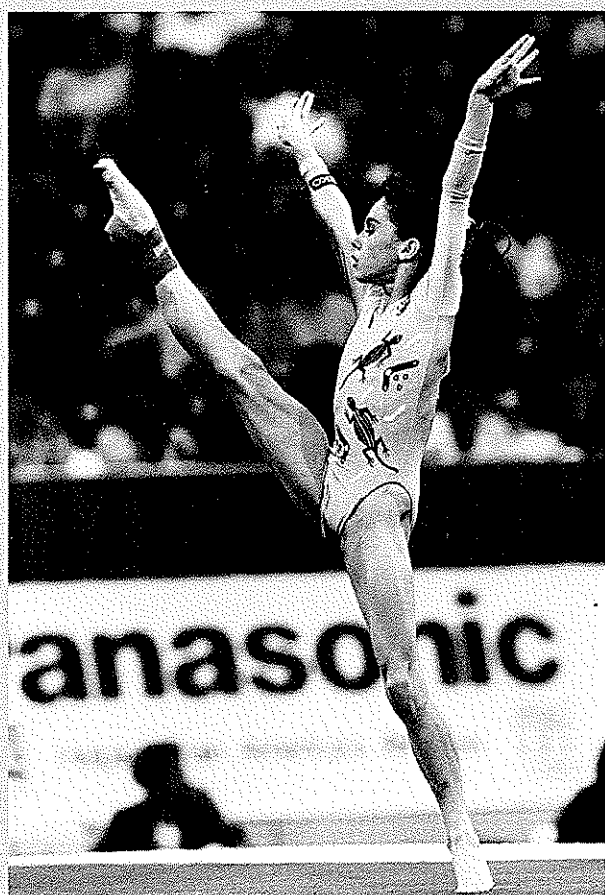
Coming into the All-Around each girl began with a score of zero. Boguinskaya, leader of the team competition, began on the beam and although she seemed a bit more tentative than usual, her running front somi mount and double back tuck dismount were still worth 9.912. Even so, the 15 year old Zmeskal began on vault with 9.962 to take the lead from the very beginning.

The next rotation saw Zmeskal on bars, generally a worrisome event for her. Here she performed exceptionally, all the way through to her double tuck - *stuck* dismount for her lowest score of the day, a 9.937. Meanwhile Boguinskaya was on floor showing her usual unique exercise, highlighted by a full twisting layout, and posting her lowest score of 9.95.

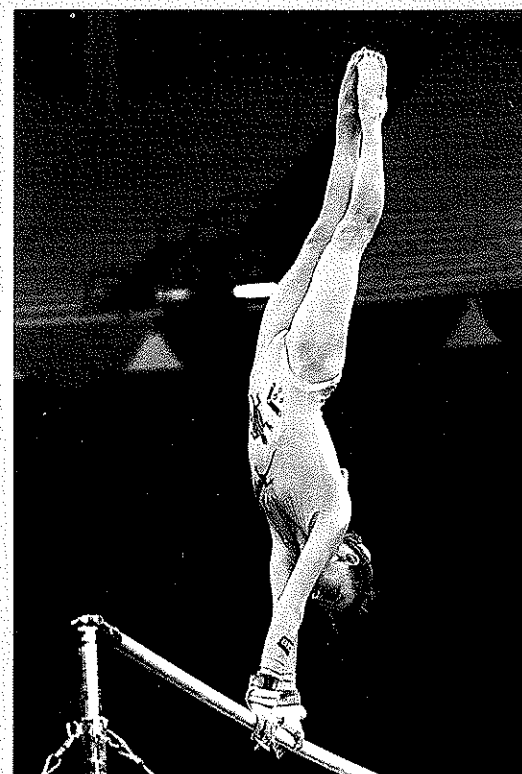
On each event both girls performed beautifully, although with two such different styles, Boguinskaya artistic, long and balletic and Zmeskal small, fast and acrobatic, one would not want to be sitting in the judges' seats. Boguinskaya chased Zmeskal all evening, and in the last rotation earned a 9.912 on bars with a *high* reverse hecht and double tuck dismount, leaving her .112 out of first place. Zmeskal finished on her best event, floor exercise. She had no idea what she needed for a score, as she mounted the podium, only that it had to be "the best routine of my life." And she may have done it....to some eyes her 9.987 seemed low!



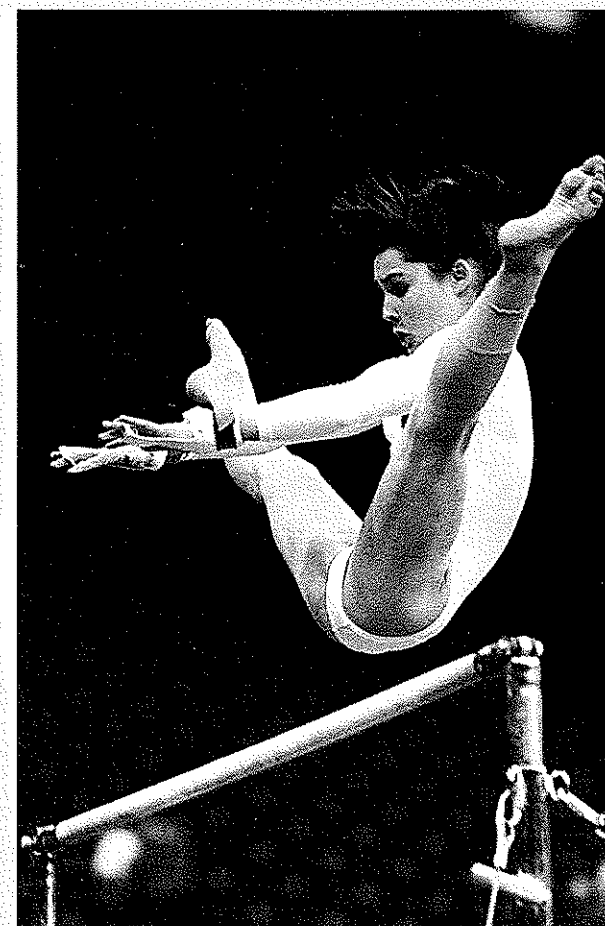

Zmeskal and Boguinskaya were not the only two gymnasts in the Hoosier Dome....and the other top girls were right behind them fighting for the remaining top places. Cristina Bontas (ROM) won out, capturing the bronze with some fantastic gymnastic displays. Her floor exercise was a particular crowd pleaser, as it began and ended with the strains of the American National Anthem with a few dashes of various traditional American folk tunes in between. She ended with her hand on her heart and the crowd roared. One would have thought she *was* an American!

Elizabeth Okino and Shannon Miller of the US gave some beautiful performances as well. These two girls should be considered among the world's most beautiful gymnasts, both possessing wonderful form and amplitude. It will be a great sight to see these two in Barcelona.

While the top girls were fighting for the medals, *hitting* every routine, there were also some disappointments, notably Henrietta Onodi (HUN). In 6th place following the team competition, she seemed a possibility for a medal in the all-around. But after falls on bars and beam, even her 9.95 on floor and 9.912 on vault could not bring her higher than 31st overall.

That three Australian girls should make the All-Around was equalled only by their **amazing** 6th place in the Team Competition. All three, Joanna Hughes, Monique Allen and Kylie Shadbolt posted some amazing scores for some truly top class exercises. Hughes was the top Australian, her strongest exercise being bars with a 9.862!! Allen came 21st with a high 9.85 on bars following a high reverse hecht and a solid double tuck dismount. In 29th place came Shadbolt. Fortunately she was able to recover from the fall on her beam dismount and post a 9.775 for her lovely floor exercise. She's a wonderful performer here.

Following the Awards Ceremony, where an amazed Boguinskaya took "only" a silver medal, there began a "war" involving the US and the Soviets. Boguinskaya was asked if she would have won were these Championships in Europe, to which she replied, "Yes, 100% sure." And, in such a close competition the dethroned champion is probably correct, although her answer did not sit well with US coach Bela Karoli, who fired back that Boguinskaya's reign was over and she should

retire. Boguinskaya replied she didn't know what her future held and later said she was pleased with her performance and was happy for Zmeskal. Young Zmeskal could only say she kept thinking she was dreaming and would soon wake up and find she hadn't won a all! One can only hope to see this type of close competition in Barcelona - hopefully with Zmeskal and Boguinskaya.

EVENT FINALS - day 1

Individual apparatus finals were competed with men and women performing on both days: men three events each and the women two.

The men began finals with floor exercise. Scherbo followed China's Chunyang Li, who had a disastrous exercise for 9.150. The Soviet began with a full twisting layout, his middle pass consisted of double twist to punch front and ended with a hop on his double layout. Team-mate Korobchinski out did him to take the gold with a top notch exercise containing beautiful extension on every move from his 1 3/4 layout somi to double layout. And he was originally slated as an alternate! The bronze medal went to the last performer, Japan's Nishikawa. Some originality gave him a slight edge over Italy's Chechi.

On women's vaulting it seemed that several of the girls had difficulty performing their second vault - one which they seldom use. Most have perfected only the one needed for team optional's and all-around. Boguinskaya began well with a Yurchenko full twisting layout for a 9.95. A large step on her handspring front tuck gave her only 9.75, for an average of 9.85 and a 5th place finish. All-Around champ Zmeskal was next but landed her Yurchenko full very low and took a large step on her front 1 1/2 somi leaving her only seventh. Onodi redeemed herself after All-Around and tied for second with Tchusovitina (URS). The gold went to Milosovici (ROM) for her beautiful Yurchenko layout full (two judges gave her a 10.00) and a handspring tuck with half turn.

Pommel horse was an exciting event, showcasing the highest score of any men's finals (and also the lowest). China did well to earn silver and bronze medals by Linyao Gou and Jing Li respectively. Valeri Belenki (URS) captured gold in his only final appearance, with wonderfully extended flairs to handstand and a handstand full pirouette across the horse for his dismount.

Only the second 10.00 of these entire Championships was recorded on uneven bars. That Bontas could score a 9.862 and place only seventh, was a clear indication of the quality of all the finalists exercises.

The only girl below her was Lisenko (URS), who received a stress fracture in two fingers on a simple drop to low bar. Gutsu (URS) and Miller tied for the silver medal, both girls showing beautiful form and the same releases - Gienger and reverse hecht. The People's Republic of Korea earned its first medal in the history of the World Championships, and it was a gold! Sixteen year old Gwang Suk Kim's age was disputed by many at only 4'4" and 68 pounds. Her amazing first release was a reverse hecht with a front somi. Later she did a Jaeger followed by a double back tuck to dismount. But is it really a 10.00 simply because the crowd gives a standing ovation before any score is shown? Bent legs should not score a 10.00 and this was certainly evident on several occasions.

Rings proved to be an event final displaying some beautiful exercises marred only by some hops on landings. Italy's Chechi showed incredible strength and used a full twisting layout to dismount for 9.837 and earned a bronze medal, his first here despite qualifying for three events. Wecker (GER) began with an L cross to L to handstand to inverted cross to planch and ended with a double twisting double tuck to earn the silver. It seemed as if every routine got better as All-Around Champion Misutin performed beautifully for 9.875 and his third gold medal of the Championships.

EVENT FINALS - day 2

The second day of event finals began with men's vaulting, while the women fought through balance beam.

In vaulting scores were low, with Korea's Ok Youl You capturing the gold with a mere 9.70 average for his 1/2 layout front somi that *FLEW* through the air and *stuck* and a less superior 1 1/2 layout. Sherbo and Aihara (JPN) followed capturing the silver and bronze.

Beam was an exciting event with six girls "hitting" their exercises. The beautiful Gutsu was first up with a round-off back flip on and later a full twisting back tuck and a full twisting

perfect Shoushounova. She earned 9.95, while her teammate Boguinskaya followed with a much simpler exercise, yet also more solid, to earn .012 more than Gutsu. This left Boguinskaya with the gold and the younger girl with silver. Okino was next and made history performing a triple turn (a double had been her trademark previously) so that, even with a large wobble at the moves conclusion, is should now be named after her. Milosovici tied for the bronze with Okino. Perhaps the greatest surprises were that Yang Bo (CHN) came only fifth, but this was due entirely to two steps on her double tuck dismount. Shannon Miller's exercise was, with Bo's, probably the most beautiful in these finals, but she also had problems landing her dismount.

Next it was on to another exciting rotation with parallel bars and women's floor exercise. Only three scores above 9.675 (Nishikawa-JPN) show that there were several mistakes on parallel bars. Highlights of Jing Li's gold medal winning routine included a double front and then a double pike dismount. Silver went to former World Overall Champion Korobchinski, just edging Linyao Gou for the bronze.

Floor was another close final for the women. Milosovici was first up and opened with an amazing whip back to full twisting double back punch front. The entire exercise was superb and contained wonderful choreography, all to earn 9.925. This tied her with Miller, who was just as beautiful, reminding one more of the graceful older Soviet gymnasts, than the miniature fourteen year old "bouncy" style one would expect. Tchusovitina (URS) was even more spectacular than the first two, but so different. Her exercise contained a full twisting double layout, full twisting layout (into the rafters), full twisting tuck and double pike...but almost no dance to speak of. This put her in first position with 9.962. Not for long though, as Bontas approached the floor and produced her finest exercise of her four finals, as she once again captured the attention of the crowd and the judges to tie with the Soviet. Bronze went to Overall Champion Zmeskal, with a spirited exercise not comparable with the two winners in difficulty. So what happened to Boguinskaya in one of her best events? A 9.862 was good only for seventh place, following some difficulty on her full twisting double back. One cannot go without mentioning the Hungarian,

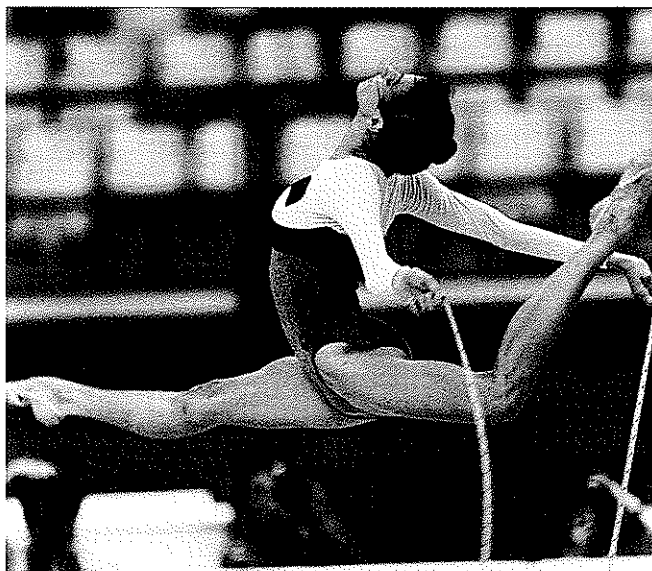
Onodi, who struggled through all four finals with a sore back, not noticeably bothering her until this last event. We can only hope this talented gymnast will be back in top form soon.

On to the final event of these World Championships. A little unwanted excitement was created in the beginning, when Iketani (JPN) hit the bar hard at his chin/neck, as he missed a Gaylord. He fell to the mat, but after some anxious moments walked away, with assistance, to a standing ovation. Scherbo, up next, showed two nice one arm giants to reverse hecht and then a layout Tkachev to score 9.775 and earn a bronze. Chunyang Li had a wonderful piked Gaylord and a layout Jaeger to full twisting layout somi for a 9.787 and a share of the gold with Buechner (GER). His Kovacs and reverse hecht were extremely high, but his form was not what it could have been.

As an end to these Championships, there was nothing but controversy. During awards ceremonies Zmeskal and Boguinskaya continued their "war" of the press conference following Women's All-Around Finals. During vaulting ceremonies Zmeskal failed to shake hands with Boguinskaya, but did not miss anyone else. This went largely unnoticed, until the following day during the floor awards when Boguinskaya congratulated all finalists and marched straight past Zmeskal, as the entire stadium booed her. The young American said she had no recollection of missing Boguinskaya, while Boguinskaya refused to comment. Whatever they *could* have said, there are no excuses. We can only regret that on the day following the end of competition, virtually all newspaper headlines remembered those few moments, rather than the hours of fantastic gymnastics that had been on display. But there has always been controversy in gymnastics and we must strive to be above it and remember that performances on the equipment, no matter how wonderful, will most likely always be overshadowed by the *other side of gymnastics*. We must try to ignore that other side though. In Indianapolis there certainly was a lot to overshadow those last dark moments. The entire world, more nations than had ever assembled, got together to "*Share the Magic*" of gymnastics and hopefully block out everything else!

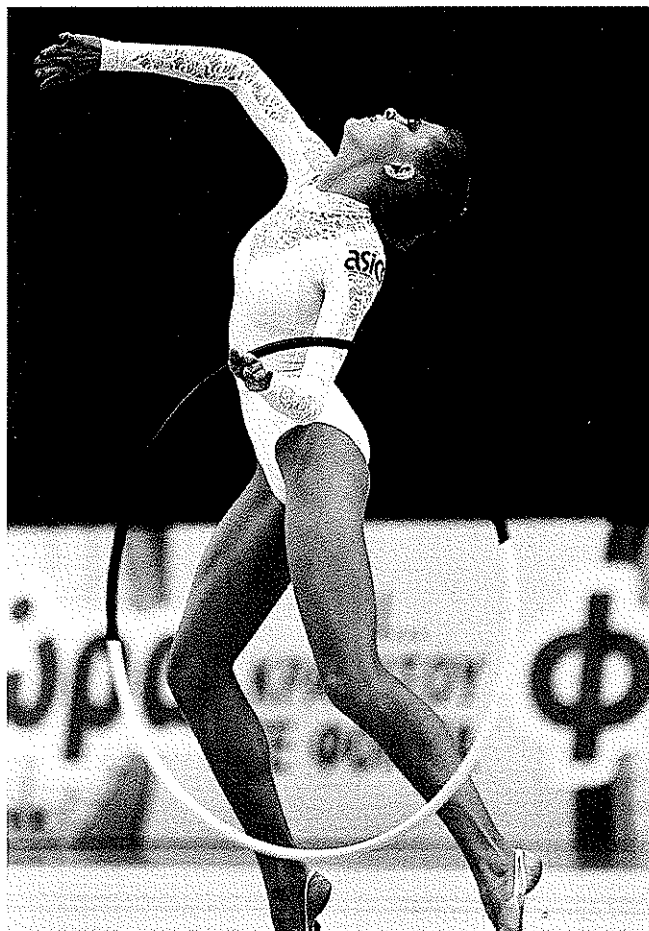

- 30 teams participated.

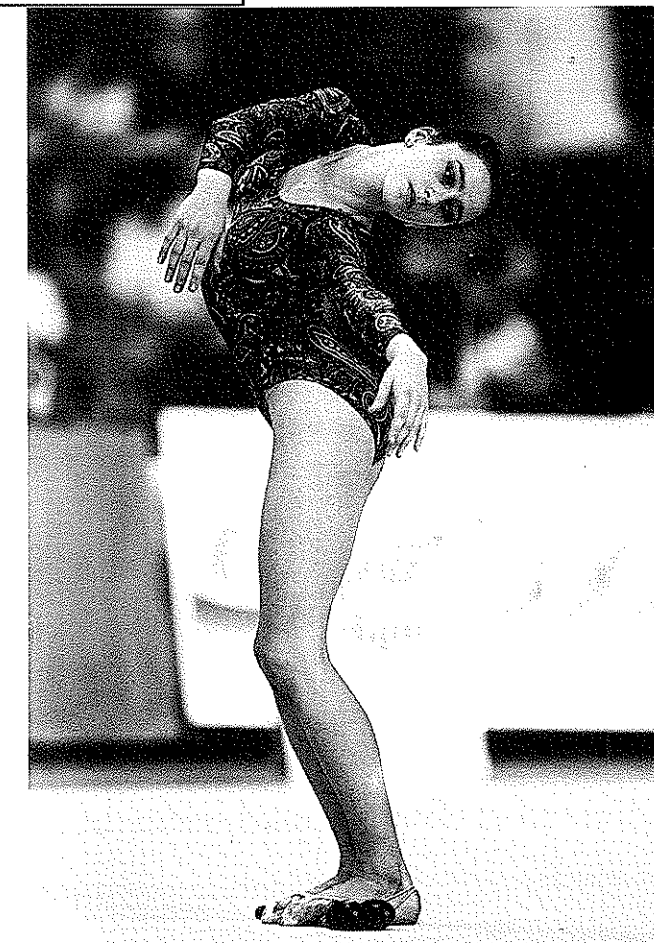
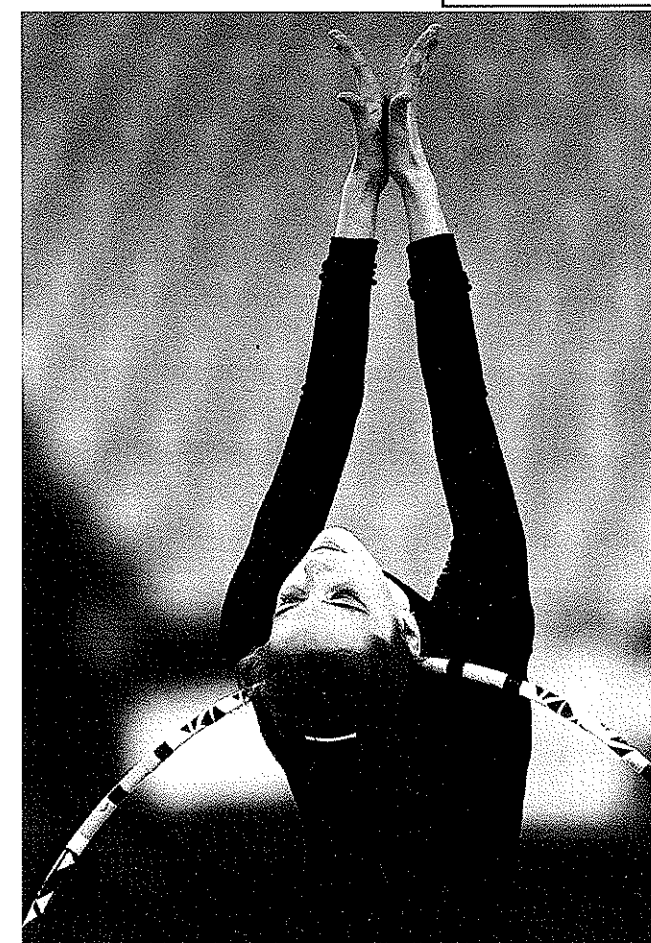
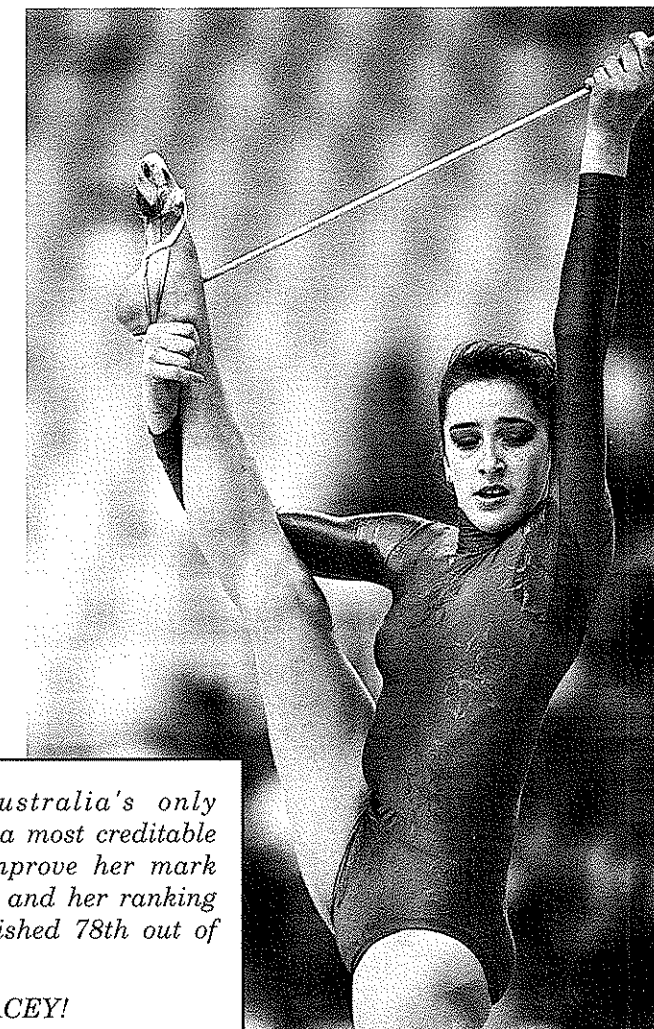
